I don't know what prompted me to choose that one, maybe the cover drew my attention. Whatever it was, those stories of their adventures and activities set the pattern of my reading for ever!

Taking a break from reading for enjoyment while I worked followed by the need to read with my children, I was later able to read my chosen genre – detective novels again. To address the more 'cultured' side of my reading I also joined a book group which broadened my reading material. But still, and especially if the group's chosen book is a bit heavy, I always have two or more books on the go.




Reading about people committing crimes isn't exactly what one might term 'suitable' reading for a person who calls themselves a Christian but I like trying to unravel the plot and discover whodunit before the revelation.

Recently a novel I have read

delivered a' shock-ending'- the detective hero died! I wasn't expecting that. This is a fairly unusual ending for a detective novel. How would the author recover from that? How would the reader? So now I wonder if the author of the novel will continue. For him the question is 'What comes next?'

This is the question which will have confronted the disciples following the events of their past



three years and the last week of Christ's earthly life. What next? All their hopes and expectations shattered. Now they live in fear for their

own lives at the hands of the Jewish elders – members of the Sanhedrin. We read a report of a crime committed and the perpetrators are revealed for those who have eyes to see and ears to hear. And for those who are blind then the liar and blasphemer has met his just deserts. It's The End.

So to answer the question 'What comes next?' At the beginning of April we will celebrate Holy Week from Palm Sunday to the foot of the Cross on Good Friday. *WE* know what comes next. The glorious Resurrection on Easter Sunday, the appearance of the risen Christ to Mary Magdalen in the garden, his appearance to the disciples and then to Thomas, the doubter.

Continuing into May we will see the disciples baptised in the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and sent out, now as Apostles, to preach the Good News and teach. We will learn of the thousands coming to give their lives to the Lord, encouraged and sustained by the Apostles.

The Resurrection of Christ is the twist in the story, the 'shock-ending' if you like. However, this is a story with a happy ending – a story of sacrifice, of hope, and of an abiding love – the love of a Father who gave his only Son that we might have eternal life. It's not the end – it's THE BEGINNING.

#### Volunteers for 24/7 contact

We do need 24/7 contact details in case of emergencies. We are looking for volunteers to join us on a rota of perhaps a month at a time. If you could please consider coming on the rota to share the load, please speak to Helen K. In the past 2 years Helen, Joyce and Allison have been on the rota and we haven't been contacted .

Allison and Helen have prepared a list of guidelines/ instructions which include contact details of services which may be required in the event of a call out.

#### How it works

The phone number is 07454 543934 The phone supports CALL DIVERT to another number

1. The phone will link to the person on the Rota

2. The phone remains in the office and is charged there as needed eg every Friday

3.We change the call divert number when handed over to someone else.

4. If there is someone in the office they can pick up - it diverts after 15 seconds of ringing.

Advantage is ... only carry 1 phone (your own), everyone knows where the phone is.

Texts won't divert but I think most people will call the phone if there is an issue.

#### **Remembering Jean – Jane Weedon.**

Thank you Carolyn for the privilege doing this today And to Joyce Nicolson and Joyce deans, Jenni Rayne, Janet Mortimer, Robert Harvey and Christine Novelli for sharing their memories with me, which have helped to shape this tribute. To be honest I didn't know where to begin, except to ask Robert how long we have, because we could be here all afternoon and evening!!

People have described Jean as a dear friend, a sister, a treasure, a friends right arm. We have

known her for her love of God, her warm and loving nature, her kindness her friendship. She was an incredible straight talking love for people offering herself and her home for those in need.

She was an encourager who treated everyone equally and wanted everyone to know how much they were loved. She was even described as a force to be reckoned with and of course there were her 'Boys'!

She could also be very determined and immovable, these are qualities in a person who gets things done. All of this is true but I was looking for something special that I couldn't quite put my finger on. I would have loved to have found one of those Prevarication and Persuasion type words Jean was so fond of that described her to a 'T' but that wasn't to be. Then I heard someone talk about a person, a stranger in a new area with no special position or influence, not rich or well connected who had become a pillar of their community and I thought that is it! That is what Jean was and that is exactly why she will be so missed.

Jean arrived here with her family in 2007 at about the same time as me. I met her on her second visit to the church, she told me she had been doing the Cooks Tour but she hadn't been welcomed anywhere the way she was welcomed here. She had found her church and her people. This welcome was so important to her that she was very soon on the welcome team and has been its organiser for many years.

Janet wrote: Jean was one of the first people to welcome us to the Church when we arrived four years ago. Her welcome was so warm and loving. Jean helped and encouraged us to get involved in the life of the Church family. She was wonderful at encouraging and offering constructive criticism in a very loving way.



Jenni said I love the way she shared her loves, which she had so many. Books, performance, knitting and her wonderful grandchildren, her faith. That reminded me that everything she got involved with came from her passions, the things she loved to do which she shared so freely with us. As Jenni goes on to say 'She didn't just join clubs, she made them and encouraged others to join our community'. Jenni cherishes the memory of the baby shower that Jean and Caroline arranged for her when she was expecting the twins, her love and understanding and utter acceptance of the boys as who they are autism and all and her words as Jenni anxiously tried to keep Howard calm during a service she said. "Don't worry this is who he is, he's just being himself and we love him for who he is, just as he is." That was Jean the right word in the right place and the right time.

Jean freely shared her tears with us as well and we soon discovered that anything to do with babies in sad circumstances moved Jean to tears. On one occasion she had heard about 'Fish and Chip babies' in Africa so called because all they were wrapped in was old pieces of newspaper. She talked with such passion that we soon found ourselves knitting vests for these babies, Several suitcases were filled and sent. This eventually led to the beginning of Knit and Natter. That group of ladies has knitted for so many causes and not surprisingly they were often connected with babies and children.

Joyce Deans recalled how Jean made her feel so welcome at the group even though she couldn't knit very well. She invited her to sort the wool and wind skeins and bobbins of wool into balls

Jean always wanted people to feel good about themselves and to see that everyone has something useful they can offer.

She didn't want people to feel lonely either so once a month after church she started the Sunday Lunch. This saw a group of about a dozen people going to lunch at the Drs Tonic.or other restaurants in town. Covid curtailed that activity but Robert shared that it has just started again and I am sure Jean would be glad to hear that!

There were bigger dreams too like the Hertfordshire Festival of Words and the Tea Dance with its Summer and Winter Balls. The Festival of Words ran for a quite a few years with a number of us finding ourselves involved with the committee or adjudicating or on the day. I didn't know I had an ambition to be an adjudicator and nervous as I always was I thoroughly enjoyed myself! It was a opportunity for schoolchildren to learn poetry and perform it or to write stories and illustrate them. This combined more than one of Jeans passions and was really well received being taken over eventually by one of the participating schools.

The Tea dances were also a great success on a Saturday afternoon once a month. Lots of people helped whether they could dance or not. She tried very hard to ensure that Robert and I could at least dance a waltz with lessons from Cherylle and Mike – Robert made a much better job of it than I did despite Mikes best efforts!

The Balls were quite spectacular. Christine mentioned her dream to dance the waltz in a gown to Moon River. Jean and Cherylle hatched a plan and so it was that Geoff the music maestro danced her around the room at the first winter ball – a truly magical moment

Sometimes Jean could become rather determined and once she had made up her mind about something it was hard to move her. Jean had been nominated several times to be an Elder but she was determined that she wasn't good enough, Holy enough, religious enough to take on that role. It took a lot of internal spring cleaning and persuading that none of us are worthy but if God calls us, God provides the gifts we need. It was good to have her on board. Her straightforward approach to things and willingness to get stuck in was a great addition to the team. She did have her complaints though threatening to come in her pyjamas because she was ready for bed by 9pm and the meeting often went on beyond that. When Carolyn and Brett were away she had another little ruse to end the meeting early. We were invited to meet at their house, in the garden if it was warm enough and we had to end when we could no longer see each other!!

When the churches in the Synod were asked to work in groups we became part of Heartland and the Mid Herts cluster which meant me taking services elsewhere a couple of times a month. Jeans heart for the church came to the fore in her desire and determination to see the Worship team birth and flourish. I know she has encouraged quite a few of you out of your comfort zones to participate in various ways and to discover talents you didn't know you had or were shy of using

This team really has flourished adding great value to the worshipping life of the church and to the fellowship.

Jean often shared stories with us about Stockport Sunday School and it was a great privilege to be invited to preach at their anniversary one year and meet

her friends., Some time later a group of them returned the favour taking worship here. They encouraged us to share our love -for one another and for God with the wider community by telling us about the history of that fascinating place of worship and how they had done just that over the years.

And so I could go on! The stories are endless for all of us who valued our friendship and found ourselves doing all kinds of things we might not have got around to on our own.

Carolyn told me that a little girl who had recently lost a loved one once asked Jean what heaven is like .Jean said I don't know but it must be really special because no one ever comes back.

Of course the only one who ever did was Jesus. Now Jean knows for herself that all his promises are true. Having taken that step from life to Life she knows just how special Heaven is, where there will be new horizons to explore and she is surrounded by love beyond measure.

What an awesome legacy she leaves behind and I have heard some of you talk about honouring her by keeping it going. Although we know we will miss her it is only as time goes by that we will realise just how much.

Several people mentioned how Jean aways left us by saying 'I do love you, you know.'

We say that too... Jean We do love you, you know for who you have been to each one of us

not just for what you have achieved. We thank God for you and hard as it is we lovingly let you go into the future that awaits you. Kahlil Gibran wrote

And what is it to cease breathing, but to free the breath from its restless tides, that it may rise and expand and seek God unencumbered?
Only when you drink from the river of silence shall you indeed sing.
And when you have reached the mountain top, then you shall begin to climb.
And when the earth shall claim your limbs, then shall you truly dance.

Keep on dancing Jean!

World Day of Prayer in Wheathampstead - members from all three churches gathered at St Thomas More Catholic Church for this annual service, this year written by the Christian women of Taiwan. The theme being 'I have heard about your faith' and we heard the struggle that it's people have, the country itself being caught up in a superpower struggle and that it is being harassed by China and the risk of conflict is very real.

Included in the service of hymns, readings and prayers are short letters from the women of Taiwan about the

difficulties they face daily. The meditation on the scripture reading, Ephesians 1 15 - 19 includes this passage 'Even in the face of adversity we need to remain focused and faithful and align our will to the will of God. For Christians, opposition and adversity are never far away. Spiritual advancement will always face opposition but if we, like Paul encourage each other, the people of God, we in turn will also be encouraged'.

The service always finishes with the hymn 'The day thou gravest,Lord, has ended ' and it is a very powerful thought that it was being sung as part of this wave of prayer right across the world. Next year's Service is written by the women of Palestine.

Chilli and Chocolate Night - this was a fundraising event to raise money to replace our very draughty, ill fitting and difficult to open church door into the Chapel Gym. We had a great deal of fun and over 100 people enjoyed a lovely meal and answering a very tricky(for some!) chocolate quiz and a session of live music. We

This year Christian Aid are focusing on Malawi, where food, fuel, fertiliser and school fees (no free education there!)



have doubled in price in the last 12 months. Drought, storms and floods have devastated crops.

But support from Christian Aid has helped Esther. For ten years, Esther grew "pigeon peas" but could never get a fair price for them from the middlemen who exploited her. She has now joined a local co-operative run by a Christian Aid partner. She has learned how to store her peas in a warehouse, safe from increasingly heavy storms, and, by joining together with other farmers, she can sell her peas for a better price and at last turn them into a profit. Pigeon peas have long roots which make them drought resistant and they can be ground into a flour to bake bread and cakes.

There will be a Welwyn Garden City Male Voice Choir concert at 7.30 on Saturday 20 May (tickets £10 from me) and I will put out Christian Aid Week collection envelopes on 14 May after church.



#### Building redevelopment plans at WGC URC

Not many buildings stay the same throughout their life even if they appear unchanged from the outside. In my career, the first office I worked in was a former wing of a high-class hotel in Westminster where the individual suites were converted into offices, my final office had once been a garment factory, but you wouldn't have guessed it from the outside. The earliest WGC houses will no longer be heated as originally designed, even if they have not been extended or remodelled inside.

Our own Church in WGC is no exception, I can think of at least four major changes, and in due course proposals will be brought to a future Church Meeting to proceed to the next stage of our major building redevelopment plans.

A lot of what I set out below is from memory or presumed. When first built at the very end of the 1920s the building was not entirely as visioned by its Architect, Louis de Soissons. Our main worship space was the Sunday School Hall adjoining the 1000-seater Church for all denominations (never built) although the dedicated space for young people is not marked as such on the original drawings still held in our archive and brought out from time to time.I guess that from 1930 when the new Church was officially opened until after the last war, the building must have been regarded as fresh and wasn't altered much, if at all.

The first changes happened in the mid-1950s when almost consecutively the pipe organ was removed at the far end of the worship space leaving the recess and stage that we would recognise today. At the other end of the building, the Lower Hall, Quiet Room and the upstairs accommodation were constructed. Old photographs in WGC books show the building as was. The line of the original external wall can be positioned by the ceiling beam in the ground floor Hall. Up until this time, the quite simple Kitchen was where the toilets are currently situated.

In the 1970s a big storeroom for bulk equipment for youth work was constructed off of the Lower Hall.

At the beginning of the 1980s a legacy enabled extensive rebuilding of the ground floor to be carried out. The WCs were repositioned to open up the Vestibule, and a vastly improved Kitchen moved into the 1970s storeroom, the

Church was rewired and electric tube heating replaced with convectors in the worship space.

Changes in the Vestibule meant the loss of one of the two pairs of doors leading into the worship space, that had effectively formed an air-lock. The existing doors are originals, the other identical set have disappeared. The changes in the 1950s and 1980s created the present layout which suffers from lack of circulation space meaning facilities can only be accessed by going through other spaces, our revised plans will rectify this situation.

The legacy mentioned earlier has been referred to in the past as the Phillips' graves money. The Church was left a sum of money from the estate of a couple in South Wales who had been married in the Free Church. The money came with strings that the Church looked after graves in Hatfield Hyde cemetery in WGC and in Newport 'in perpetuity'. Legal agreements are not supposed to bind any organisation with such an onerous obligation. At the time there were widely differing views on whether the money should be accepted or declined. In the end, a judicial opinion said that it should be taken on condition that the Church sets up the mechanism to fulfil the request at least in the short term and this is what was done, although recently the separate fund has been absorbed into our general fund. Regarding the graves that come within our oversight, we know details of who is buried, but not of their relationship to Mr. and Mrs. Phillips, information which has probably been lost without a lot of genealogy searching. However I may provide more details for the magazine in the future as a permanent record.

PS If Allison can provide space in this current magazine, there will be an early picture of the Free Church; it shows the building before the construction of the 1950s extension to the right. The outbuilding to the left is where the entrance to the car park currently exists, and was never built, but examination of the brickwork either side of the present Vestry entrance door will show provision for where the external walls might have been extended out at a later date.

#### **Climate Meeting**

In March, Welwyn Hatfield Interfaith hosted a Climate meeting in our Main Hall at WGC. From the enthusiastic comments, questions, and lively discussion, it's fair to say the audience were captivated by the presentation we received from Helen Burridge, Trustee of the charity SustainableStAlbans, who is employed by Herts County Council to co-ordinate with the borough councils on their plans for achieving Net Zero energy emissions. And also by the experience of Herts County Councillor Paul Zukowskyj who used to research the changes in vegetation in southern Spain and saw first hand the effects of global warming. We learned that Carbon Dioxide levels in the atmosphere are at their highest for 800,000 years, and that Nitrous Oxide and Methane are also contributing lots to the greenhouse effect.

Though it may seem like individuals can't do much now, and only largescale interventions by governments can change systems sufficiently to reduce global warming, Helen and Paul think efforts by ordinary people to reduce our own carbon footprints will still make a big difference if lots of us do them! And yes, reducing our airmiles, using cars less or going electric, eating less meat especially beef, and using less gas and electric at home are all positive actions to reduce emissions, along with buying local products without inbuilt airmiles or negative impact on forests. I was shocked to see that the carbon equivalent of a bar of chocolate is huge! Worse than eating pork and chicken! Relevant information for Easter, perhaps.... Another of Helen's graphs showed me that my train tickets to Aviemore in April for my spring holiday will save 90% of the emissions I would have caused by flying up to Inverness. So that seems like a worthwhile choice, though it will cost a bit more money, not less!

You can get an estimate of your own personal carbon footprint from the WWF calculator on-line, and compare it to the UK national average in 2020 (12.7 to 14.1 CO2 equivalent per person), or to the current national target on the net zero pathway (9.3 per person).

You always knew who needed you. I think it was the first Christmas after Dorothy died. I saw Tom and felt sad as it was the first time Tom didn't have a silly present to show us all. You noticed too. You got up and went and sat beside Tom. Sometimes the love of a big dog helps. You loved visiting Georgina. Whenever we were in town you would stop and look up towards St Nicks and that would say. Can we visit Georgina?

We usually made a bee line for Waitrose to buy a slice of cheesecake or some treat. You and Georgina would sit together on her little sofa. Content. Sometimes Jack was there and you were very fond of him too. You loved your visits. From the day Georgina died you never asked to visit again. You knew when you were needed and you were there. You loved the shops and the pubs! Your very first walk was straight to the pub! You sang and you did your maths lessons. You loved adding subtracting dividing and multiplying, as long as the answer was never above 10. How everyone loved it when you got the answer! How proud you were when the clapping would start!

The clapping got you into trouble in the church. There you were, practically asleep. Jane was the Vicar and it was communion Sunday. There is singing and clapping. This is about me you think. And you run towards Jane. Poor Jane thinks you are after the communion. Roger her husband jumps up and looks like he might Rugby tackle you. I'm sitting next to Beth. Heron would fly. You and your friend the Heron taught me that the experience was greater than any photograph. You two would stand side by side and would look up to the horizon. I often wonder what you spoke about or did you just enjoy the silence, The Magpies. We had 2 living in the garden. In the summer when the French doors were open one Magpie would waddle in whilst his or her mate would keep Guard on the patio. One day he came into the kitchen, there you were lounging about. The Magpie walked up to your dinner. Stood on the edge of your bowl and enjoyed a feast. You watched and kindly shared your food.
