An interview with Martyn & Lynn

It is coming up to the year's anniversary of Martyn and family joining us, so I thought that I would send Martyn some questions and he could answer them. Well, it didn't quite turn out that way, and an interview was decided on. I'm no Michael Parkinson and Martyn..... let's just say things improved once Lynn joined us!

Unfortunately, I did not record anything, so in fact this is all taken from my notes and is not verbatim, but Martyn has read it and I think I made any alterations needed!

1. What has been the best thing about this last year?

"Just coming here and being welcomed. We were very touched by the way Alex was considered both before we came, and at the 'Preach with a View' weekend, as it was a very long weekend for him. The open communication between the churches is good and very different from some of the churches that I've served in before. This makes it much easier to manage."

"In previous churches I would often find myself alone prior to the service in the vestry, but in both WGC and Harpenden before each service we meet for prayers. Lynn was also included over the 'Preach with a View' weekend. This was important, unexpected, and very much appreciated by us"

2. What has been the worst thing about this year?

"Nothing much at all. It was difficult leaving the school community and, of course, the beach, but we are finding that network at Alex's new school. "

"The ruddy roadworks!!"

3. What have you found is different between the three congregations?

"Not an awful lot to be honest. All three are welcoming, grace-filled, and caring communities.

"Each church has plans and goals to promote God's love in different and distinct ways, further building community and connections, both within and without the church.

But if pushed, I have to admit Helen C's shortbread wins the biscuit stakes!"

This then led to an interesting conversation between Martyn and Lynn about, just how much shortbread Martyn could get through!!

4. Have all the family settled well?

"Yes, everyone has settled quickly. Our biggest concern was for Alex, but he has settled in really well, and is having a birthday party soon with all his classmates. (In fact he will have had it by the time you read this.)

Mum and Dad have made friends and enjoy visiting the library, coffee mornings, and a monthly lunch with YWAM (Youth with a mission). And they chat with their regular 'bus buddies'.

Lynn has found a job in a library at Abbott's Langley which she enjoys very much."

5. What have you enjoyed most about moving to Hertfordshire?

Although we miss the beach, there is some very beautiful countryside in Hertfordshire."

"Being this close to London with a direct train has been great. We have visited lots of Museums, Alex's favourite being the National History Museum."

"Being nearer to Martyn's brother, and much easier to get to visit Lynn's family"

"The 20 minute commute between the Churches is a lot better than before, even with the roadworks!"

6. Who is your most annoying paid member of staff?

"Allison".

Now, I fully expected this answer and wouldn't have asked (well maybe I would, but not have published the answer!), if that hadn't been the reply. If Martyn hadn't said me I would have felt I wasn't doing my job properly! 7. Were the profiles of each Church accurate?

"I can't think of anything that was far out. It has been great to see that honesty, as it's not always the case with all churches. We were looking at vacancies and profiles, and it was actually the moderator that suggested this one for us."

8. What would you like to develop in each Church and/or the Pastorate?

"I would like to encourage overt discipleship and encourage people to be even more grace-filled. It was encouraging when I heard that someone in the Bible study had commented that they were trying to have more Grace"

That certainly wasn't me folks, not on a Friday afternoon in the office at 31 degrees. But Martyn, I am trying, only 3 "sorry God's" this morning and it is 11.33am.

I will continue to lead the Flower team, look after the Rota, ensure there are flowers in church weekly and on all special events and occasions. I would love to have a few more people interested in arranging flowers and am happy to help anyone who is interested in joining our team of 3. All you need is a love of flowers.

2) Christmas Fayre

I am aware that we are only in July and this seems a long way off but last year it became very apparent that to continue with the Fayre in the same form is becoming a challenge due to many of those who have been our loyal helpers' advancing years, health issues, and some sadly no longer with us. My capabilities have been diminished following my own health issues since April.

The Fayre is the first event in a busy lead up to Christmas and when appeals were made for help last year for the fayre and other events throughout the year few new faces offered their help.

It would be sad to cease holding the fayre as over the years it has built up a following, people look forward to the event and it offers us the opportunity to reach out to our community. Since 2008 we have donated 50% of our Christmas Fayre takings to Isabel Hospice. Isabel Last, the founder of the Hospice, was a member of our church and we are proud to say that to date we have donated over £17,000.

So please give careful consideration as to how we move forward in 2024 with the Fayre and other events we have all come to enjoy and expect to have on our church calendar it would be sad to lose them. Ideas and suggestions would be greatly appreciated and help with the planning and running of these events by perhaps forming an Events Team. I am open to ideas and suggestions.

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends,

Firstly, thank you for all your contributions to your local church in 2023. This includes your financial contribution which plays an important part in the life of the whole church through the Ministries & Mission Fund.

As officers of the denomination, it's good for us to be rooted in a local URC (or LEP) congregation and to work out our faith in the local context, as well as across the entire United Reformed Church. On the other hand, it is good for you in local churches to know that those who serve you nationally understand the local church financial issues as well. And there have been some big issues over the last 12-18 months: inflation, a "cost of living crisis" for many, with energy costs rising unprecedented levels etc. Churches and ministers have had the same challenges as so many others.

The M&M Fund of the URC pays for ministers' stipends, training, Assembly costs and all the central support functions for ministry in the URC across three nations. The M&M Fund's main income is contributions from the churches with some top-up from synods, together with investment income and grants etc.

In 2023 the churches continued to support the M&M Fund to a wonderful level, but there also was significant and generous synod support. Overall, the giving to M&M Fund was slightly ahead of budget at £16.3 million. It was also only 2% down on 2022's result. However, we should note that these figures include the synods' extra contributions this year which amounted to £1.9 million, an increased amount compared to 2022.

The full M&M account for 2023 in summary:

Income – £18.2m – of which 16.3m was from churches and synods contributions Expenditure – £19.3m Deficit – £1.1m

2024 is not going to be an easy year either and we are again budgeting for a deficit. We have a commitment from synods to continue their support on top of church contributions and a plan for balancing the M&M budget over the next 5-7 years, including budget reductions of central costs of 3 to 5% p.a.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2023 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

Stewardship of our resources, personally, as local churches and as a denomination is rarely easy, but it is one of the challenges we are called to in making our faith real. As the Spirit directs and as our means allow, can the churches once more continue to respond to the call of our gracious, loving and ever-generous God? Again, thank you all!

Created on the Third Day

From my kitchen window I can see a majestic silver birch tree. I enjoy watching at it as the seasons pass each year. In the winter months, when it has no foliage, it reveals its intricate and delicate structure – which is when I prefer it. Then it rises starkly white and graceful against the gloomy skies.

Trees play a significant part in various biblical texts and the first tree we encounter in the Bible is the **Tree of Knowledge**. Despite the accepted idea regarding it as an apple tree, commentators suggest the fruit Adam ate could have been a fig, a pomegranate, a grape or even


an apricot. Since Adam and Eve clothed themselves with fig leaves it might be logical to conclude that the fruit was a fig! No matter which it was, it led to the downfall of mankind.



Fig trees and figs feature many times in

the Bible. Isaiah used a fig to cure Hezekiah's boil (2 Kings 20:7). During King Solomon's reign, when peace prevailed in Judah and Israel '*each* man dwelt safely under his own vine and fig tree.'

And in the New Testament Jesus used the fig tree in several parables. He cursed the barren fig tree (Matthew 21:19), a parable referring to man's 'fruitfulness'; or possibly the dangers of not <u>living a fruitful life -</u>



<u>resulting in some drastic pruning.</u> Then we learn that Nathanael – a sceptic - was spotted by Jesus as he sat under a fig tree (John 1:48). <u>Let's</u> <u>not</u> forget to mention the sycamore tree where Jesus spotted Matthew. Calling him down, Jesus went to his

house – the outcome being Matthew became one among the first

disciples. It is recorded that Judas hanged himself from a tree – whichever it was, it is now known as the Judas tree *Cercis siliquastrum*.

An interesting fact! When we read of Jesus' references to faith and mustard seeds we may question the bit about mustard seeds growing into trees – well I did anyway! In fact, the mustard, scientifically known as *Salvadora p erisica*, is a popular evergreen shrub that can grow to a height of between 6 to 20 feet and produce a crown nearly as wide given the right conditions.

And finally, the biblical tree-references end with the description of the tree in the Holy City as described in Revelation 22.


Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, clear as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb down the middle of the great street of the city. On each side of the river stood the **Tree of Life**, bearing twelve crops of fruit, yielding its fruit every month. **And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations**.

July 2024 – Saturday Families Church and Friday Nights

Saturday Families Church has been running fortnightly all year, covering a mix of New Testament and Old Testament stories. Recently we have enjoyed Elijah hearing God as a still small voice, the Healing of kind lady Dorcas by Jesus, and Peter being freed from prison by an angel. Many weeks include a 9 year-old or two, so to illustrate the story I usually project some of the excellent cartoon pictures or photos of actors in biblical settings from the website FreeBibleImages.org. We have a number of 2 to 6 year olds attending as well, so I also try and include some physical visual aids and story actions to engage them. Last weekend we watched a flag on a sandcastle sinking into the water while a flag propped up amongst stones stayed put! (and hopefully no one noticed the sand spilled on the floor....) It helped bring to life the parable of the people who listened carefully to Jesus' words being like a wise man building a House on Rock to withstand the weather, whereas a foolish man built his House on the sand and it crumbled in the rain. I usually include some up to date childrens' songs from youtube or ffct-ideas.org.uk, but the old song 'The Wise Man built his house upon a rock' was belted out lustily by all our adults, perhaps to the surprise of children who were hearing it for the first time! A couple of Saturday families now join us for Family Gamesnight and occasional all age worship on Sundays.

On July 6th we hosted a lunchtime social after Saturday Families Church, called a 'Picnic in the garden', for which we had invited lots of families we used to know and were looking forward to seeing old friends. Shame we couldn't schedule nice weather! The weather (and some illness) dissuaded many from coming. Nonetheless, some of our regulars were glad to meet 3 families from Chatter and Tots and we all had a wonderful time, mainly staying indoors, and a few brave older ones ventured outside during a sunny spell to try Swingball.

Bibleheroes met twice this term with 3 families learning about Nehemiah: his compassion for the inhabitants of his ruined homeland and fantastic organisation skills leading a mission to rebuild the walls, and then rebuild the community life in Jerusalem. There were some fantastic voices produced in our dramatic reading of parts of the story, and wonderful clay models of goblets as Nehemiah was originally cupbearer to the king of the empire. And somehow we got through a long list of family names and job titles of all the various people who took part in the building team by means of an outdoor game! The builders faced some intimidation from neighbouring tribes and were worried about being attacked, so they carried swords whilst working, but they also trusted in God's protection and were able to finish the wall without needing to fight. Here is a picture of some of the swords the children decorated. We also prayed for each of the children to have resilience and perseverance like Nehemiah.

Every month we have also enjoyed Family Gamesnight, and been thrilled to use the garden this term. We wish all our families some refreshing holiday-time over summer, and pray for their new school classes next term. And we are glad to hear that Jonathan has settled into his new school in Dubai, although we miss him - lots!

Potential Youthclub

Next term we are planning two experimental 'youthclub nights' on Friday evenings, for ages 11 to 16, inviting the youngsters now in their teens who have grown up with our Saturday or Sunday church, especially those already attending Family Gamesnight. A couple of people have already agreed to help, and if there are any other potential volunteers who would like to get involved with launching a Christian-based youthclub in our church please do let me or Martyn know by mid-September. John Fawcett was born on the 6th January 1739 at Lidget Green. He came to believe in the Lord Jesus, as the Saviour of sinners, at the age of 16, after hearing a sermon preached by George Whitefield in the meadows near where he lived to a crowd of 20,000 people.

Fawcett almost immediately had the desire to preach the Gospel. Time saw him Ordained and appointed to a small congregation of Baptists at Wainsgate, Hebden Bridge, West

Yorkshire in 1764. The Chapel was rebuilt in 1859. It still stands today and is managed by the Historic Chapels Trust.

John Fawcett, who died in 1817 is remembered by his tombstone in the church

graveyard. He wrote "Bless be the tie that binds" to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the events that occurred when he and the family tried to leave the people they loved for a much larger and important position at Carters Lane Church in London.

Their wagons were packed with the few pieces of furniture they possessed, and they pulled up outside of the church to say goodbye to the people. But the emotions of grief and sorrow displayed by them that their Pastor and family were leaving them, were so great, that John said to his wife, "Mary, I don't think we can do this!" So! full of love for the people, they turned their wagons around and the horses were given the reign to make their familiar way home!

AMALGAMATION TEN YEAR UPDATE



You've heard the saying, "How time flies when you're enjoying yourselves". Well, that may be an exaggeration but everything has been so positive since the amalgamation that I was amazed when I realised it was ten years since Woodhall Lane URC and The Free Church had come together on our new pathway in faith. Although seven of us from the original Woodhall Lane congregation transferred, sadly there were a few people who were frail and so could not attend any services in person. We had already been attending joint services and meetings with WGC URC for several years, when appropriate, making new friendships through social events, Christmas and Spring Fairs and of course sharing joint leadership of our Minister Rev Jane Weedon. This meant we were welcomed into the fold in a most natural way.

Although low in numbers we were able to come to partnership with a reasonably healthy bank balance and once the property had been sold the Synod held a good sum, which, one day, we may use to help our new church refurbishments. The first service of our newly amalgamated church, Welwyn Garden City United Reformed Church, was on Sunday 14th September 2014 and was led by Rev Andrew Prasad from Synod. Looking at photos of that amalgamation event, sadly five of those present from Woodhall Lane have now passed away. I do love to look at our memorial book, displayed in the church vestibule, showing those five names and the dates of

their passing. It is lovely to remember them.

There have been a few changes in the past ten years. In 2018 Rev Jane Weedon took a well-earned early retirement to the Lincolnshire countryside and we all missed her very much.

At the end of 2019 we were subject to the dreaded COVID. It was an enormous challenge, when in February 2020 it became evident that this was something we had never experienced in our lives before. Public places including churches had to be closed and a very hard time was ahead for many folk, young and old alike, with some terrible consequences.

Suddenly a new word appeared in our vocabulary. Zoom! This turned out to be a blessing for millions of churchgoers around the country and the world. We were blessed with some clever technical folk at our church who kept us involved in services for the best part of a year. Zoom turned out to be a real blessing giving people the opportunity to join our worship if they could not attend in person. We also continued Bible Studies and Christian Meditation groups using this method.

Once Covid had rearranged our lives and we were able to return to something like normality we started the search for a new Minister.

This task always takes a while and we were able to find alternative leaders for Sunday worship, and it was during this time that our Worship Team was formed. One of this group this was our dear departed friend Jean Hughes who gave great encouragement to anyone wishing to join. This group continues as a vital part of our church leadership today. Another project started up in 2017/8 by Christine Novelli was the Community Coffee Morning. This was for anyone in the community: the lonely, the homeless or anyone just wanting a coffee/tea sandwich or even freshly cooked homemade soup prepared by our team. Donations usually covered the costs. Christine went on to new employment and Liz Laing took on the the leadership in 2019. The cafe had to close during the Covid period but open again now, we also welcome friends from The

Mind group who come for company and support. Sadly last year Liz had to relocate to Scotland. Our Church Centenary celebration was, of course, delayed by Covid!

Last September we welcomed our new Minister Rev Martyn Neads who ministers to three churches: WGC URC, Harpenden URC and Wheathampstead URC. Martyn's induction and celebration was a wonderful event and we were blessed with a lovely summer's day.

So, as we enter this new chapter of our church we do so with optimism and faith. Linda Sutton (WGC URC)


Alongside raising their children, Jane and David, Mary worked as a teacher, and John in his family's retail businesses before pursuing a very different career in marketing roles in the City.
