As I was reflecting on what to write for this magazine I realised that this is the last magazine I will write for in this way. There is so much I would like to say but where do I begin?

Firstly I want to say thank you for travelling with me. In WGC for the last 14+ years and 5 years for Harpenden and Wheathampstead. Roads are rarely flat or straight and there have been some twists and turns and we have seen some changes in that time.

In WGC our study groups have expanded, and we have deepened our relationships with one another and with God through sharing together. The addition of Wendy and Liz to our staff team have bought a delightful expansion of our reach to families and those on the margins, and the biggest change, the amalgamation of the Free Church and Woodhall Lane. What a blessing that proved to be and that blessing will continue as the legacy from the sale of the building will help fund the new building being planned at the moment.

Reflecting on this I realised that each church has plans for new things ahead. Harpenden are just beginning to see new things happen as we emerge from the pandemic and Sharon is able to begin the work that has been over a year in planning since she became part of the team. It will be our 200th anniversary next year as well with a lot of plans afoot. What an amazing milestone to celebrate.

At Wheathampstead we are all systems go for the charity, the refurbishment of the church building and working towards the opening of The Chapel Gym. With amazing community support this will be a huge blessing to the community and the church. What exciting times ahead for all of us.

Some people have asked me how I know it was God calling me to make a move. God is capable in speaking to us in many different ways. There was a lovely quote in the book read by the Cluster Book Club last month when one of the characters realised '..that she had put all her confidence in her ability to hear from God instead of God's ability to speak to her in a way she would recognise and understand.'. (Two steps forward by Sharon Garlough Brown).

We could narrow this down to three main areas. There are the internal nudges, sometimes even divine disquiet as God 'stirs the nest', rather like the mother eagle who pushes her young out of the nest in order for them to fly (Deuteronomy 32:11). All of this can get caught up with human emotion and our

own desires (exactly why we discern together in Church meeting when we have decisions to make) so it isn't good to rely on that alone.

Another way God speaks is through the written word in scripture. In my case, when I was wondering if the restlessness, I was feeling was mine or God's it was a verse that said to stay where you are until you are told to go – or words to that effect. When that verse came up again in a different context this year, I realised the message had changed. I was settled by this time, but God was saying it was time to go.

The other way God speaks is through other people and it is always good to listen to what people say to you. It was my spiritual director who pointed out that the idea of a future ministry that was taking shape in me, with a clarity I had not experienced before, was as much God's calling as a move to another church. Friends and family have said something remarkably similar. So, I stopped arguing with God and listened. That obedience, especially when it affects others, both family and churches is never easy but we are all in God's hand and trust God when God says:

For I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord. "They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope. Jeremiah 29:11

So where are we going? Our new home is in Heckington in Lincolnshire.



Heckington has a couple of claims to fame. It has the only 8 sailed windmill in Lincolnshire and the parish Church is one of the top 100 churches in the country. It also hosts the biggest village show in the country with an average of 30,000 people visiting the village on the last weekend in July. This year it is one day only and very limited tickets on sale. Our road is closed that day so not a good day to visit!!

During lockdown they also started a community radio – a DJ from Radio Caroline days has retired there, which was a great help when people were so isolated. The radio included the service from the parish Church each Sunday. The old URC building is now a Community Centre, so the closest URC is in Sleaford 15 minutes' drive away.



Our home is a barn conversion that stands in 2 acres of land. As you can see from the photos, some of it is pretty much a blank canvas and as we have discovered, will take a lot of work to get it to a place where the work is minimal.

I am not sure we will achieve our long-held dream of self-sufficiency – we are probably a few years late to start on that now!!! But growing our own fruit and veg will be a delight. Whether the hen house gets new occupants is also a matter of debate!



I am really interested in permaculture principles that amongst many other things, encourage you to work with nature rather than against it, ensure everything you do is sustainable and has more than one purpose. So, you plant edible hedges and ground cover that you can eat. Lots to learn as we begin that task.

The biggest plan is for a log cabin for people to stay for holidays or retreats and a garden room for group use, crafts or simply for those in ministry to have a day away with no agenda but to spend time with God. Will it all happen? I have no idea but it is in God's hands as we all are so we will see what develops.



Thinking of making that move I am sad at leaving you all and not ever being a person who likes to miss out on the action, I am sad not to be part of the exciting plans for the future. It is hard to imagine not having the busy life of a minister that I have enjoyed over the last 26 years but looking ahead I am excited by the possibilities of being 'freelance' and excited for all of us to see how God shapes what is coming next.

Please pray for us as we make this change and go through all the upheaval and emotions of parting and starting somewhere new.

You will all be in my prayers with praise and thanksgiving that when God calls God also provides from the superabundance of Gods store house.

Continue to pray for one another and for the future. Look for all that is good in each other, and the life of the church and the blessings God pours out each day. They remind you of God's faithfulness when the road gets a bit steep or rough underfoot. Then look forward with hope for the person God has already planned to come and share your journey in the future. They don't know it yet so patience may well be required – but who knows when I went to Lymington it was the shortest vacancy on record!!!

You are in my heart, and this comes with love and prayers that whatever the future brings God is with us and blessings will abound!

I am looking for Scone bakers using Jessie's Recipe which many of us in church now use. The advantage of Jessie's recipe is that you can freeze them and after 15mins in the oven from frozen they are just like freshly baked scones.

If over the summer you can bake and freeze a batch using the recipe below I would be extremely grateful. We can put the frozen scones in the church ovens on the day. If you haven't got freezer space you can bring them to me and I can store them in my freezer until needed. (Unfortunately we won't know how many scones we need until later but if frozen this won't be a problem)

Scone Recipe

1lb S/R Flour 6oz Soft Marg 2 eggs 4tbs Butter Milk

- Rub marg into flour beat eggs with Buttermilk and add to mixture
- Roll out about 1" thick (use a 2 in cutter which will make scones of a suitable size for our needs) Bake for approx. 20mins on 210°c/ gas mark 8.
- From frozen reheat 160 for about 15 mins



CT and MRI scans also have confirmed Amanda's tumours are shrinking. Laura's latest CT scan confirmed she has no metastasis (her cancer is stable) and her children have found fabulous job opportunities.

She added "Sometimes my prayers are silent, like a quiet knowing that God has gone ahead and provided for me, so I always Praise the Lord afterwards. I never cease to be amazed."

They in turn provide us with a copy of their public liability insurance cover, safeguarding policy (where needed) and risk assessments.

New reality, same Mission – Robert Harvey

I have been thinking about a booklet which our Elders and others in our church have been studying. It is a booklet that our national church has sent out about responding to the pandemic. It's called (as above) "New reality, same Mission." It points out that the mission to which God calls us is one that gives priority to the needs of those who suffer most, particularly in times like the present. We are all in this together and must share with and care for those who have the greatest problems.

How have we been we doing this? Joyce has been sending out to us, from members of the congregation, prayer requests for relatives and friends who are sick or in distress and we have been praying for them. People in the wider community have been invited to leave ribbons on the memorial garden fence asking for prayers for loved ones. Volunteer food shopping has been offered for those who need it. Liz, our Mission Developer, has channelled support to the New Zion Food Bank and to local charities like the Resolve Homeless Charity and the Women's Refuge and has arranged Zoom meetings and community walks. Wendy stays in contact with the families who have come to the children's services and activities she has arranged. These are some of the things we have done to share the love of God.

Also, of course, many people in the congregation have given help to others individually. One of them has given me permission to tell you about what she does – Melva Spalding, the daughter of Janice Spalding who died in February. Melva is a great cook and baker and so she makes cakes and scones every Friday for six elderly friends of her mother. She also has them to lunch at weekends in threes. (It has to be in threes she has only three chairs at present. Melva sits on a stool.) Meals showing the love of God at work, in our midst.

Finance Matters Harpenden

Over the past 16 months since covid lockdown restrictions came in to force we have benefitted financially from reduced operating costs relating to our utility usage and salaries which have had the benefit of the government's furlough scheme.

Last year we had an operating loss of £10938 and with some of the above savings still in place albeit slowly coming to an end I would anticipate now that 2021 will come in at a slightly higher deficit of around £14K mainly due to the severe cut back in hall lettings.

As has been mentioned before we have seen a significant increase in those who are participating in either regular monthly standing orders or making regular direct credit payments into our church account which greatly helps with both the forecasting and monitoring of the church finances as well as easing the administration process through not having to make so many trips to the bank.

Our Gift Day collection which took place throughout the month of June has reached a total including gift aid of £2710 which compared with last year's total of £1981 is an excellent result and thanks to all concerned.

Our Manse which is rented out with the proceeds helping to part fund the cost of our Children & Families Minister and also part shared with WGC has had tenants for the past 18 months who are associated with WYAM but are now leaving on 20th August. However as some of you may have read in the local press a family living in Tennyson Rd suffered a severe fire to their property and are currently homeless and having to find suitable accommodation to rent via their insurance company and, having to move very quickly, we have hopefully managed to organise a tenancy agreement with them for a minimum period of one year which is certainly a blessing to the family who will only be moving around the corner.

Finally our Pre school whilst closed for the main part of last year has managed to soldier on this year with at times much reduced staffing due to covid issues and together with increased covid related costs it is anticipated it may run at a loss this year compared with a £5684 profit last year.



Dear All,

As the sun has returned these last couple of weeks in July, round-bale silage making has been completed, and now hay making has begun. The rain in June was very good for grass (and weed!) growth, but our fingers were itching to get the mower running. For round-bale silage, it is a case of cutting the grass on the first day, raking it into rows on the second day and then baling it on the third day, although this process may be speeded up if the weather is really good because the grass would otherwise wilt too much before being baled. Our contractor, Paul, has a marvellous McHale baler that makes a bale and then tips it into another section of the machine for wrapping while the next bale is being made. It then tips out the wrapped bale and so the process continues. Very clever stuff - as long as it keeps working - there are rather a lot of electronics as well as mechanical motions that can run into problems that aren't easy to fix without the assistance of an engineer.

Hay making obviously takes a few days more as the grass needs to dry out completely. Rather than raking the mown grass directly into rows, it is spread from the rows, usually twice over three days, before being raked back into rows for baling when we are satisfied that it is fully dry. Hence the high pressure system this week (I'm writing this on the 19th July) is ideal, and we have a 10 acre field cut for hay which is drying nicely. Paul has a square baler for baling this, which makes 6-, 7- or 8feet by 4 feet by 3 feet bales with six strings around them. Despite these bales clearly being oblong, they (and the baler) are still referred to as "square"! When Rose comes to the farm at the weekend following the end of term, I will expect her to pick up on this anomaly, because she has been learning all about 2- and 3-d shapes at school. Down at Sandwich, work has been going well for Sarah at the Pfizer Business Park, where the business is based. They are now putting together work for an ISO accreditation, so that current (and more) clients will provide them with food samples for testing. They have also recently been inundated with golfers and golf-fans down there, due to the Open Championship going on. However, Sarah informs me that most of the small roads in the town were marked off as out-of-bounds

to the golfing crowd to save things getting out of hand. Rose has been getting along well at school. We will be welcoming them both here on the farm for some holiday. I plan to put up my tent in the orchard for Rose and myself to do some "at home" camping with breakfast eaten outside, even if we do get it from indoors! It would also be good to take her to the seaside. In Somerset we are blessed by having a short distance, either north or south, to get to the sea but with stay-cations being the order of the day, we fear we may be like a lot of sardines in a tin whichever direction we go in. But then the beauty of living in the countryside is that you only have to walk outside the back door to enjoy the air and sunshine (when it is shining!). So we wish you all a relaxing summer, even if you have to stay at home.
