Coffee in the Chancel of St Helen's Church will continue to be served with a variety of mostly home-made goodies on Tuesday and Saturday mornings from 10 – 11.30.

They will also have a Community larder (and fridge) operating, to support people in the village who are struggling with the extra cost of providing food to families over the holiday 10-4 each day.

On the last Tuesday of the month (30<sup>th</sup>) we will be meeting with others in our hall at 5.30 pm ready to eat the meal prepared by the Community Kitchen team at 6pm. Some of us will have helped with the preparation others with serving or clearing up, all of us will enjoy the company and meal together if the previous events are anything to go by!

In September most of the regular activities in the village start up again and we will be welcoming new members who have recently joined The Chapel Gym. We also expect to have a range of fitness classes available for people to sign up to – some to be held in the gym and others in the hall.

We will be involved in the International Day of Prayer for Peace on 21<sup>st</sup> when folk from all the village churches will gather in St Helen's for prayers at noon.

The Community Kitchen meal will be eagerly awaited on 27<sup>th</sup>.

Dear Friends,

Is anyone back to normal? After two years of pandemic and lockdown, and Covid still with us (thankfully, for most, in a much weaker form), we can now worship together in person and find fellowship again. But for most of us it is not simply a return to how it used to be; some people have not returned to church, some have died or become too frail, some churches have closed and others considering it.

Now we have significant European turmoil and its likely effect on fuel and food prices for us in the UK. Thank God that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13 v.8). Whatever else changes, He is our rock, our cornerstone.

Financially, things were extremely tough for churches in 2021. Plate offerings had collapsed; some regular givers had to reduce or entirely stop giving to support God's work; and those churches which hire out their premises had seen income from that source disappear. Even those churches where the majority of the giving was by standing order or bank transfer (*if you have not considered regularising your giving in this way, please do – it helps your treasurer significantly*) may have seen a 20%+ drop in income.

If this had been replicated in giving to the M&M Fund in 2021, we might have been faced with a serious financial crisis last year.

But no, through the generosity of individuals, churches and Synods, we can report that income only fell by 4.4%. With a similar reduction in expenditure the M&M Fund result was a deficit of only £80,000 (less than one-half of one percent of income), a deficit that can be comfortably covered by reserves.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2021 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With churches and individuals under financial pressure, 2022 is not going to be an easy year either. The M&M Fund budgeted income (based on Synods' projections) will not be sufficient to cover expected costs and we are reconciled to dipping into our reserves more seriously as a result.

However, if we "ordinary Christians" are to fulfil the call of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world around us we need ministers and other workers "on the ground" and we need shared resources which are often best created centrally. That all comes from the M&M Fund.

#### WGC URC Redevelopment plans

Some of you will already know from Joyce Nicolson's recent news e-mail, which was sent out on the WGC URC e-mail string, that our planning application to the local council for a building extension and alterations was successful. But more about that later on.

This decision brings us to a point after many years. Early in Jane's Ministry, the YMCA leased the upstairs at the Church for running before and after school children's clubs. The YMCA approached the Church with the proposal of building social housing on the Church grounds and using the proceeds to fund major alterations in the Church. Before anything could be finalised, grants for social housing evaporated and the YMCA decided to concentrate their efforts in Hatfield where they saw the greatest need.

After a bit of a gap, WGC URC decided to pick up the feasibility scheme again, and after a competition, a Cambridge firm of Architects was appointed. They are now called B B + C Architects.

After several stages of redevelopment plans, a scheme for extensive redevelopment was produced, and funding would again be based on selling land as with the earlier YMCA ideas.

This scheme was the subject of pre-application advice from planners which nowadays has to be paid for.

Discussions led to the Architects being asked to simplify their plans to something more affordable without selling land, but still meeting the brief.

The existing Church building offers good accommodation but suffers from lack of circulation, meaning that occupied rooms must be entered to gain access to other spaces. Toilet facilities cannot be accessed directly from the grounds which restricts the use of this valuable church asset. Kitchen and toilets are overdue for improvement and the upper floor facilities can only be reached by stairs.

The Synod Property Enabler has been involved on our journey to planning permission.

The Architects came up with three separate options, which were quickly reduced by omitting Option C, which offered little benefit, but would have been far more complex to construct.

Of the two remaining Options, it was decided to apply for permission for the larger one, on the basis that if permission was refused, we could immediately scale the proposals back.

The Architect's plans are on display in the WGC URC vestibule.

Depending on the form of construction and the quality of finishings, the cost was reported to Church Meeting as being in excess of £1 million.

Construction industry inflation is currently running high and will need to be market tested in due course.

Our planning permission lasts for three years and if it expires could be reapplied for and would probably be successful again unless circumstances change.

Permission came with just the one condition, that external materials to be used are approved by the Council before work starts, this would include type of facing bricks and colour of windows, for instance.

Successful permission with just one condition was a complete surprise, because our pre-application planning advice came with so many strings attached.

As mentioned above, permission would expire in time, but making a meaningful start would protect the scheme. What this might mean would need approval of the planners.

The Architect sees the installation of a disabled lift as being a qualifying item, and this would have the benefit of improving access to upstairs and another kitchen, set of toilets and hall space in readiness for when the similar facilities on the ground floor are taken out of use.

Another view likely to gain momentum is that the first phase concentrates on providing the shell of an enlarged kitchen and access to toilet facilities from the grounds at the rear.

The proposed Church Meeting in August will provide an opportunity for all views to be expressed and hopefully a consensus reached, which the Church building group will take forward with the Architects.

The next stage will involve taking on sub-consultants to complete some of the outstanding sustainability information which will eventually be required.

In the meantime, we are going ahead with a permanent tea point at the back of the main worship space which Church Meeting has approved to replace the present temporary facility which has found favour with users.

As a separate piece of work, we will look at creating a technology hub with units matching the tea point in order to provide secure storage and workstation for recording of services.

#### The 'Good life' in Lincolnshire

It has been lovely to see so many of you over the last few months and to see so many positive things happening. I pray this will continue as you support your Elders through this protracted time of vacancy.

Our good news this month is that we got the planning permission we applied for and work begins in earnest this weekend. Hopefully the major upheaval will be over in two months time leaving us with the mammoth task of relandscaping and a general tidy up.

The shepherds hut is being built at the moment and we have chosen colours for the kitchen and outside. Went to see the work in progress and it is really quite

exciting, we are eagerly looking forward to seeing the finished product and getting it settled. In the meantime, we have trenches to be dug to set railway sleepers in the ground for it to rest on. The sleepers have arrived so we are hoping the digger driver will help us out!!



The Garden Room is on order for delivery and installation in September so that means we have ground to clear in preparation for the base laying at the end of August.

The work began on Sunday – of all days – and it bought home to us just how much we will have to do once the water pipes have been passed and the electric cable is in. Anyone fancy a week of helping fill in trenches????



The garden had been growing well. We have had successful harvests of mange tout, radish and salad greens, French beans are on their way and the kale has been abundant in the raised beds. Cucumbers and tomatoes are doing well. There were a few additional kale plants left over from the raised bed so I thought we would just put them in the ground to see what happened. The rabbits happened and they have made

very short work of stripping them down to stalks! We also put Brussel sprouts in with the kale - we hadn't intended growing these but some plants came our way and the rabbits don't seem so keen on Brussels so we will see if we have any success with them. They are so cheap and plentiful here it hardly seemed worth the effort of growing them. They were sold on the stalk for about £1 last year and are so fresh with hardly any mileage from farm to shop but we would have an unintended bonus if they do grow. Berries have been plentiful and the established raspberry canes have had a bumper harvest. I have made 16 lb of jam and we have eaten raspberries almost every day for 2 months. One of my favourites fortunately.

The biggest change has been the arrival of Chantys' chickens. Ava (named after herself by our granddaughter!!), Gertie, Melia and Bluebell have settled in well. They were too young to lay eggs when Chanty first got them but 6 weeks on and they are all laying. One is even laying eggs with double yolks every other day. They are characters and will do just about anything for kale. They lay just about the right number of eggs for us and we have even given away a dozen eggs in the past 2 weeks as well. They do taste good and although they are probably the most expensive eggs we have ever had (given the cost of the housing etc) they are well worth it. So lovely to go from nest to table in just a few hours.



The one down side is that the dogs think chickens look quite tasty so they are having to be kept in the paddock out of their way. During the heatwave we were spraying them with a mist of cold water every half an hour, dunking them in their water bath and

feeding them watermelon, kale, dandelion and lettuce all in the water to keep them hydrated. They were not keen on being dunked as you can imagine but it did cool them down. We needed the same treatment by the time we came indoors!! The heat wave has seen the earliest barley harvest on record here and many farmers concerned for their crops due to lack of rain. Our water butts were emptied weeks ago so we can understand their concern.

Keeping hydrated with a cool refreshing drink I was reminded how much we need God to refresh us and rehydrate us. Our spirits might be lifted by an unexpected call from a friend, by remembering the words of a favourite hymn or favourite stories from the Bible, taking time to sit and quietly reflect and remembering with gratitude all the awesome ways God shows his love for us. I hope you have a lovely summer and hopefully by the time autumn arrives the major work here will be done, and we can begin to plan ahead for next year at Kairos Days Retreat.
