Dear Friends,

For to us a child is born,
to us a son is given,
and the government will be on his shoulders.
And he will be called
Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God,
Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.
Of the increase of his government and peace
there will be no end.

So says the prophet, Isaiah, in a reading that we regularly hear as we journey through the season of Advent and celebrate Christmas. It is a reading that speaks of the glory of Jesus, the Son of God, and of the reality of his kingdom.

But as we live in the here and now it can, at times, be difficult to fully appreciate the truth that God's kingdom has already broken into this world and that things are already being affected, even as we wait for the culmination of all things and the beauty of the new creation.

Among other attributes, Isaiah tells us that Jesus will be called the 'Prince of Peace', and that there will be no end to the increase of his peace. And yet, as we have just marked Remembrance Day, recalling wars and conflicts down through the years, we also watch, hear, and read the news that informs us that conflicts are continuing and escalating all around our world – most particularly at this time, in the Holy Land; though as I write there are hopes of a pause.

How do we reconcile the promise made in Isaiah's prophecy with the reality that we see in the world around us each and every day? In truth, it is difficult to do so because we live in what are often termed the 'inbetween times.' That is, we recognise that Jesus has won the victory at the cross and has brought his kingdom into our focus, yet, at the same

time, we will not see the full results of that victory until Christ comes again. This leaves us caught in a world that yearns for peace.

What then, should we do?

There are two answers that come readily to mind. Firstly, we should pray. We should pray for peace to flow in our world, and we should pray for peacemakers and peace-builders to be raised up and to be strengthened, supported, and encouraged in the work that they seek to do in our communities and around our world.

And then, secondly, we ourselves should work for peace. We may not be called to go and serve in places of warfare, or to solve international crises, but each of us regularly encounters breakdowns in peace in small ways. We see peace broken in families. We see peace broken in relationships. We see peace broken in churches. We see peace broken in streets and communities. And sometimes, if we are honest, we are either the cause of the breakdown in peace, or we are party to it.

Therefore, what we can do, is work to rebuild the relationships that have been damaged and, through doing so, work to rebuild the peace that has been broken. In this way we can truly become peace makers and, small step by small step, we can begin to bring about change in our world. It may not be noticed by everyone, but it will be noticed by those for whom it makes a difference.

This hymn by Alan Gaunt encourages us to pray for peace, real peace that comes from God and which makes a difference in our lives; but it also encourages us to take that step and do more by being those who reflect the values of the Prince of Peace whom we serve.

We pray for peace, but not the easy peace, built on complacency and not the truth of God. We pray for real peace, the peace God's love alone can seal. We pray for peace, but not the cruel peace, leaving God's poor bereft and dying in distress. We pray for real peace, enriching all the human race.

We pray for peace, and not the evil peace, defending unjust laws and nursing prejudice, but for the real peace of justice, mercy, truth and love.

Dear friends,

It feels like everyone is getting ready, getting ready for Christmas. Christmas Trees going up (even as I write!) cards being written, presents being bought, menus being planned and food being bought. Although sadly, and increasingly, for some they are not able to prepare to celebrate and certainly not in the way they might have hoped. They have a deep concern as to how they can simply heat their homes and feed their families this winter. That is if they even have a home to live and eat in.

In the past I have had the privilege of volunteering at a winter night shelter. What struck me was that everyone's story was different as to how they found themselves homeless. It taught me not to make assumptions. Some had been estranged from their families, got behind with their rents and evicted, couldn't afford to put together a deposit despite working, experienced broken relationships and so the stories could go on.

Some churches will be hosting winter night shelters, arranging warm hubs and providing hot drinks and meals to not just those who are homeless, but also to the lonely and vulnerable. As Christians we cannot close our eyes and ears to the needs around us as we prepare to celebrate Christmas. We cannot welcome Jesus and shun our neighbour. As Jesus himself said 'Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

The nature of Jesus' birth highlights who these brothers and sisters are. Jesus himself was born homeless with parents who were dependent on the charity of others to give them shelter and food. The story worsens as the family had to flee and become refugees in Egypt. Yes, Jesus was a refugee! When we fail to look out for those in need, we are hurting God.

Today our hearts and the heart of God is breaking looking at what is happening in the place of Jesus' birth. The violence and suffering in Israel and Palestine makes us stop and think, pray and act even as we prepare for Christmas. In our sanitised Christmas we usually miss out the story of the massacre of the innocents just after Jesus's birth which is recounted in Matthew's Gospel. But we can't turn a blind eye to the massacre of the innocents in the current conflict.

Martin Leckebusch in his variant of a popular carol, 'O West Bank town of Bethlehem', asks the question:

'How violently, how violently the hope of peace is riven; can God impart to these torn hearts the blessings of his heaven? Who now recalls his coming to this dark world of sin?'

As Christians we believe that peace is possible, the hungry can be fed and the homeless find shelter. And we can work together to achieve it and thus truly remember and celebrate the God who came to earth as a baby to transform a troubled world.

I would like to wish you a peaceful Christmas as you celebrate and seek to play your part in bringing about transformation in this world.

JOY TO THE WORLD

One of the loveliest Christmas hymns is "Joy to the World" by Isaac Watts. As a young man he was fed-up with singing what he called 'dreary old Psalms.' He annoyed his father so much by his continual complaining that his father challenged him to write something better. So he did! This hymn is only one of the 750 hymns that he wrote. Watts was born in 1674 and is recognised as 'The Father of Hymnody.' That refers only to English Hymnody, for as we shall see Martin Luther encouraged Christians to sing hymns over 100 years earlier.

Watts most famous hymn is 'Our God our help in ages past, our hope for years to come,' but he wrote other favourites such as, 'When I survey the wondrous Cross.' Which happens to be my favourite.'

During the Reformation in Germany in the 1500's Martin Luther had this to say about singing:

"Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise. The gift of language combined with the gift of song was given to man that he he should proclaim the Word of God through music."

Sadly, today Lutheran hymn books contain few of Luther's hymns, and those translated into English are hard to find in English hymn books. "A mighty fortress is our God," is, of course, an exception!

So, here is Watts lovely and joyous Christmas carol:

Joy to the world, the Lord has come! let earth receive her King; let every heart prepare Him room and heaven and nature sing, and heaven and nature sing, and heaven, and heaven and nature sing!

Joy to the earth the Saviour reigns! your sweetest songs employ while fields and streams and hills and plains

repeat the sounding joy, repeat the sounding joy, repeat, repeat the sounding joy.

No more let sins and sorrows grow, or thorns infest the ground; He comes to make His blessings flow far as the curse is found, far as the curse is found, far as, far as the curse is found.

He rules the world with truth and grace, and makes the nations prove the glories of His righteousness,

the wonders of His love, the wonders of His love, the wonders, the wonders of His love.

We thank God for all the Blessings we receive as members of our congregation here in Welwyn Garden City.



Here are a few lines for the folks at Harpenden

We hope that you are all well at Harpenden URC. Five years have gone by since we said goodbye. Not sure where that time has gone! Good to see that you have a new minister. At Middle Lambrook we now call on the services of Rev Tim from the Mid-Somerset Group once a month and lay-preachers for the other Sundays, or else we go to Martock URC when we cannot fill the pulpit but they have a service booked in. Tim retires next July though so we will see what happens as regards ministry for the URC in Mid- and South Somerset after that.

It has been a very wet autumn so far on the farm. Our cattle generally stay out in the fields with the option of a barn to go in if and when they want to - but there are too many of them to be shut in all the winter. However, if autumns and winters are going to carry on in this vein we might have to, well, not pull down our barns and build bigger ones like the unfortunate fellow in the Bible, but just build an extra barn so that there is a bit more room! Despite the weather, everything (silage, hay, potatoes, pumpkins) got harvested in the end, and there has been plenty of grass for the cattle, unlike last autumn. So we mustn't grumble. My father is continuing to potter around and take an advisory role. Back in October, one day when it wasn't raining, I took him for a trip around the fields as he sat in his deckchair set up on the back of the trailer. (Sorry, I should have taken a photo of that!) This was better than him sitting indoors on a sunny afternoon and allowed him to look about the farm without having to walk too far.


We were also asked by BID (the local business group) to facilitate a collection

Hello my dearest friends

Daisy and I left WGC on 28 August and although the vet gave me some 'kitty calming' medicine, it didn't work at all! Daisy spent the entire 8-hour trip voicing her displeasure of travelling by car.

I started working at Birthlink Charity on 4 September as their Income Generation Manager. Birthlink is a small Scottish charity, based in Edinburgh, whose origins date back to 1911. From 1930 until 1980 there was forced adoption practices in place in Scotland. During this period babies were cruelly and unnecessarily removed from their mothers and placed with adoptive parents. This practice did not have any regard for the mother or child's wishes or needs but was because these mothers were judged unfit due to their circumstances at the time of the birth, including not being married or being deemed to be in poverty.

Birthlink established the Adoption Contact Register for Scotland in 1984. This enables birth parents, adopted people and their relatives to place their names on the register with the potential of finding a match with an adopted person or family member who is also seeking to be reunited. They offer a free professional mediation service to families who wish to reconnect. https://birthlink.org.uk/

I feel so blessed to work there, and the staff are very supportive. I share an office with the CEO and we work collaboratively on projects. I recently updated the charity website, introduced a lottery as an additional income stream and line manage the shop manager, who oversees two of the oldest charity shops in Scotland.

While I was flat hunting, I stayed with Ryan (my son) in Penicuik. This gave me an opportunity to bond with my gorgeous granddaughter. She introduced me to soft play and I had to climb up climbing frames, go down slides and play in ball pits, to keep up with her. I'm not sure where she gets all her energy from!

I moved into my flat mid-October and thank God daily for blessing me with all the wonderful opportunities that I've been given.

I have attended the URC in Granton. They are a small and welcoming congregation.

I joined the Association for Promoting Retreats earlier in the year and thought it would be helpful to attend their annual retreat to get to know people. It was a wonderful 48 hours at Shallowford House in Stone, Staffs with Bishop John Stroyan leading us. The subject was 'Encountering God' which he introduced through icons and their meaning, scripture, story and prayer. It was a long way to go but that 48 hours was a wonderful time of refreshment where God truly was encountered in the silence and in our sharing with each other.

This time away renewed a need in me to share with people on a deeper level on a regular basis and so I have joined an early morning on line meditation group — part of the World Christian Community of Meditators and using the same material as the group at WGC. This has also been a great blessing and has opened up a new contact locally. We have arranged to meet and see where that leads us.

It had been good to be well fed because there has been work to do! The World Day of Prayer is in the preparation phase for the service on March 1st 2024. It has been my privilege to attend three prep days in different parts of the county observing what happened and then sharing in simple tasks. I had never been to such event before and it has been a real blessing to meet the people who will be organising services far and wide to share in their locality next year. The work that goes into this is amazing from gathering suitable items for a display of the country who have prepared the material to arranging and rehearsing the service, ensuing that each part has a reader and the musicians have the music. The prep days provide the first look at the service enabling people to get an idea of what they will need to do, buy relevant material and ask questions about anything from the service to practical things such as how to pay people donations to the charity.

Gods timing struck me in particular. It was 2017 when the World Day of Prayer committee in Palestine were asked to prepare for this service and now in 2023. 139 countries are sharing together reading the stories and praying for these Christian women whose theme 'I beg you, bear with one another in love' could not be more appropriate. The history of the area has been very sensitively compiled and many have gained far greater insight already into the complexity of the situation. The Christan women's voices of the area are not often heard as they are in such a minority. Only 3% of those living in Palestine are Christian today and as we watch the horrors that continue to unfold it has been good to remember that the women offered the service in love and the

timing has ensured people worldwide are joining with them in prayer for peace. If you want to read more the web site is http:/www.wwdp.org.uk
