Mid Herts cluster Vacancy news from Harpenden.

Many of you know since Jane retired in September last year we are in Vacancy. We miss Jane's leadership in our Churches and activities in the wider Heartland group. Both our individual and joint Worship teams are providing a varied range of services which are available on-line and in Church, filling the services normally taken by Jane with visiting preachers, lay preachers and Worship team members. All this would not be possible without the Tech Teams input!

As part of the Mid Herts Cluster Joint Elders meetings, we have been working towards the next steps in the process since well before Jane left. Without providing all the documents we need to use as Elders and members of the Vacancy Group to assist us, I hope we can explain the first part of process simply.

- Jane gave notice
- Joint Elders work on first drafts of individual Pastoral Profiles/Church reviews etc.
- Jane retires (Sept 21)
- Elders work on individual and joint plans providing worship including preachers etc.
- Joint Elders form a Vacancy Group (two from each Church) to work with Elders and Moderators etc.
- Joint meeting with Revd Jim Dalgleish regarding officially declaring a joint Vacancy in Mid Herts Cluster. (14 Jan 22)
- Joint Elders and Vacancy group to provide basic information (Stats membership, income etc) to enable Moderators and the Pastoral Committee, to start the process of scoping.

Next steps (time frame is open ended).

- Arrange a meeting with the joint Elders and Vacancy Group and Convenor of the Synod Pastoral Committee
- Work on a Joint pastoral profile that reflects our individual Church profiles (this will be a challenge) then submit finished profile to Moderator.
- The profiles to be sent out to Ministers once scoping/profiles are completed for them to view and respond hopefully!
- Ministers CV sent for review by the Vacancy Group (only one invitation issued).

- Possible invitation to meetings and to Preach with a view.
- Voting by Church members
- Possible call to a new Minister!

If you have a question regarding the Vacancy/process please address in the first instance to your Elder, (Correct process must be followed and will be subject to confidentiality regarding any candidate etc)

David Jonathan of Grassroots, Luton Council of Faiths and Near Neighbours "humbled" at New Year's Honour

Luton man shares MBE for strengthening community cohesion with those who have supported his work over two decades **By Steve Sims- submitted by Rev Jane W**

A <u>Luton</u> man who has spent two decades of his life building community cohesion and interfaith relations in the town has been rewarded with an MBE.

David Jonathan, 53, of the Grassroots Programme, Luton Council of Faiths and the Near Neighbours Programme says he feels "humbled" after receiving the accolade in the Queen's New Year's Honours.

Following Friday's nights announcement, David told the Luton News: "It is with a sense of gratitude and privilege that in 2021, I marked 20 years of my work with Grassroots and Luton Council of Faiths and 10 years with the Near Neighbours Programme. During these years, the focus of my work has always been on strengthening peace building and reconciliation by appropriate mediation and constant relationship building across Luton's diverse communities

"I feel humbled and honoured to be included in the Queen's New Year's Honours List 2022 and to receive the MBE for services to community cohesion and interfaith relations in Luton, but I would like to share this with the people of Luton and many others who have supported and enabled the work over the years. He added: "John Donne's phrase 'no man is an island' is a poignant reminder that human beings do badly when isolated but thrive if they are part of a community. There is nothing that I could have done all by myself. 'I am because we are', as says the African Philosophy of Ubuntu.

"So, while I shall be ever awed by, and thankful for, this honour bestowed upon me, I also remain grateful to the people and diverse communities of Luton, my past and present co-workers, colleagues, volunteers, trustees and partner agencies which include Council for World Mission and United Reformed Church who invited me initially for a 4-year term in 2001 to develop inter faith work in Luton." David said over the years, four different Church denominations have consistently supported inter faith work in Luton through the Grassroots Programme - The Church of England St Albans Diocese, The Roman Catholic Diocese of Northampton, The Methodist Church Beds, Essex & Herts District, and The United Reformed Church Thames North Synod.

He said: "I am also grateful to the Luton Borough Council, Luton Rising (formerly known as London Luton Airport Ltd) and Bedfordshire and Luton Community Foundation for supporting inter faith work in Luton through Luton Council of Faiths.

"And thanks to Near Neighbours Programme for supporting nearly 300 different community projects and initiatives, over the last 10 years, through Luton's diverse community and voluntary sector organisations.

"It is all this work that has kept Luton's diverse faith communities together, consistently over the years and that has enabled Luton to stand stronger, taller and resilient in the worst as well as at the best of the times."

Recalling Rev Dr Martin Luther King Jr inspirational quote 'Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can dthat,' David added: "At Grassroots, Luton Council of Faiths and Near Neighbours Programme and many other local faith and community organisations I have had the privilege to work with, we feel we are called to light a candle rather than to curse the darkness. We are called to embrace the 'otherness' of all those 'others' who are often perceived as enemies, despite the fact that they share common aspirations for a better world for all, just like we do.

"Long may our work continue to inspire communities to stand together in solidarity with one another and send a strong message of defiance to all those who seek to divide in the name of race, religion or ethnicity, by promoting prejudice and hate. May we appreciate the strength that comes from being united in concern and work together for the well-being of all and that of our common home, the planet Earth."

Easy peasy smoked mackerel kedgeree to add some flavour to January from Becky

The last 2 years have been a challenge for us all. The food challenge can be both dull and exciting. Before the Pandemic if I fancied a dish, it was usually for 6 to 8. No problem, I would just invite friends around. Friends, good food,

good wine and good fun spending a night at my table. That is what made me happy. I was also hit by illness that made eating difficult. Not one to back off from a challenge, I challenged myself. It was to find food that was exciting and healthy and could be made in amounts suitable for one or more. One day I will have friends again at my table, but meanwhile I can have good food by myself. This is a dish my kids loved but could be quite easily adapted to 1 or 2 servings.

INGREDIENTS:

Smoked mackerel skinned Rice 1 or 2 portions 1 or 2 handfuls of peas 1 or 2 eggs for Hard boiling Small onion Garem Masala spice to taste Chicken cube Salt and pepper to taste.

In one pot cook rice with chicken cube, peas and eggs for boiling.

Chop up the onion and skin and flake the mackerel

When rice is ready, drain it and put it in a bowl. Remove the shell from the egg. Slice the egg. Add Garem Masala, salt and pepper to taste. (Garem Masala, is flagrant, with lovely spices without the heat)

Put all ingredients together. Adjust the amounts of seasoning to your own taste.

One of those lovely meals we forget is out there. All the flavours remain distinct, and the meal is a treat of many flavours. Bon appetito

WINTER WALKING

Although we walk more when the weather is kind, we had 3 lovely walks between Christmas and New Year, which made up for several days of inactivity!

We were staying with my son over Christmas, and all went to Elvaston



Castle Country Park, just outside Derby, for a couple of hours. We were 7 adults, a teenager, a baby and a rather bouncy Staffie. The weather was cold and damp, but it is a beautiful 300 acre park, around an early 1800s gothic revival mansion (based on a 1633 house). It is owned by Derby County Council and was opened in 1970 as one of the first country parks in England. They feed the birds every day, and we saw a robin, bluetits, coal tits, a great tit, a

nuthatch, sparrows, pigeons, and rooks.

The following day, Derek and I walked a 5-mile circular walk from Calke Abbey (National Trust), round through Ticknall, again in rather grey weather (although not damp!) and quite heavy going through some muddy bits. The walk was in a Christmas book of pub



walks in Derbyshire (though there was a 1-hour wait for lunch at the pub so we had a drink and pressed on).

On the Thursday, we walked with family and friends (5 adults, 1 baby) a 7.5 mile circular walk from Wilstone Reservoir (near Tring), taking in 3 canals (the Wendover and Aylesbury Arms of the Grand Union Canal and the Grand Union Canal itself) and 2 reservoirs (Wilstone and Tring). Again, a very grey day, though dry (in spite of forecast rain), and very heavy-going muddy paths for quite a lot of the walk. We were quite tired by the end, but had a lovely day out, and saw the ongoing restoration work on the Wendover Arm. And we had a lovely meal in Tring to finish the day.

Dear All,

We hope that you are well and bearing up during these strange times. Well, Olaf is now almost a year old. Remember Olaf? No, not the snowman from Frozen, but a calf born on the farm last winter, and christened by Rose. So we thought you might like to see how he has grown from small beginnings...





...and he really has grown! Having the benefit of spring, summer and autumn grass, as well as milk from his mum, you can see what has happened:

To put things in perspective, the next photo shows him next to his mum. He is well on the

way to catching her up. Ordinarily, he would have been weaned-off at eightmonths-old, but because his brothers and sisters were born in August he will wait until April or May, along with them. As you can also see, one of the main winter jobs on the farm is feeding the cattle. So far, the winter has been fairly

kind. We avoided the worst of storm Arwen and although we have had plenty of rain it has been "spread out" time-wise, which has allowed it to soak in and do some good rather than running off down the ditch to the river Parrett. The other current job is the annual trim-up around the garden. I start to feel rather guilty about such carbon release, but I really do



need to be able to get to the back door of the house and also to the garden shed, both of which can easily get obscured by a year's growth! Sarah and Rose were here for two weeks over Christmas so that was marvellous. It was a pity to say goodbye to them as they returned to Sandwich, but the way the time flies it will soon be half-term. Rose is getting along well in Year 1 at school – I think she enjoys the Maths more than the English though. My father continues to potter along, but this is not the best time of year for him as he can't sit outside with his newspaper.


We have been continuing with Zoom services on the first and third Sundays each month, and in-person services at Middle Lambrook for the second and fourth Sundays. This allows us to meet up with the members of our congregation who do not join us on Zoom, so we are therefore catering for different requirements. On the second Sunday we get our minister, Rev Rowena Francis, who belongs to the Mid-Somerset Group of churches – we borrow her, our church being part of the remnant of the South Somerset Group of churches when it disbanded a few years ago. However, we still have good connections with the other two churches that remain from the old group (Martock and Templecombe), after the king-pin church, Yeovil, closed. Indeed, members from these churches turn up on Zoom, so it is a bit like old-times. On the fourth Sunday we rely on a lay-preacher if one is available, and if not we take the service ourselves. It is straight-forward to pick hymns, readings and prayers, but it is the sermon part of the service that can be a bit of a problem to derive. So we have found it can still be fulfilling if we just have a few thoughts about the readings, a sort of semi-Bible study. On the whole it is good to have a chance to say a few words about what a particular text says to you. We are also having a proper Bible study on Zoom every other Wednesday evening. We are working through Luke and Acts, doing a chapter each time. So it is going to take us a while to get to the end of Acts, but that is OK. Moreover, this is something that would not really have happened in ordinary times, because we wouldn't have been turning out to go to each other's houses in the middle of winter! So God moves in mysterious ways, his wonders to perform.


