The Book of Proverbs in the Bible sets out to provide divine wisdom to daily life and to provide moral instruction. It's a section easy to find coming after the Psalms, and if you open a Bible halfway through you won't be far from it.

It's not one of those books where you start at the beginning and read through to the end – anyway it's not really a story; instead, it's good to 'pick n mix'. The book was probably written about 1,000 years before Jesus Christ was born; Jewish tradition indicates three authors, the main one being Solomon, he famed for his wisdom.

The layout is a bit random and whilst I have certainly not examined every verse, I have not come across anything (so far) that doesn't still make sense for our age. It contains hundreds of short, simple statements about how to live wisely.

I was brought up in a household where there was a saying for most situations, and after all this time I find it hard to break them, although there is no one here now to reprimand me.I won't repeat them and the more of this article I write, the more I recall them.

But a simple one was 'A place for everything, and everything in its place'. Can you think of a shorter way of saying that?

With the coming of the electronic age, there are warnings that of course aren't in Proverbs.

The BBC Television programme 'Watchdog' covering consumer affairs, often has Matt Allwright saying, 'If it's out of the blue, it's not for you'. Reminding us about cold calls, of which young or old we all have to be careful.

Two others, in a similar vein, come from John Ruskin (a nineteenth century writer on many varied subjects) which were always good for me to remember during my working life:

'There is hardly anything in the world that some man cannot make a little worse and sell a little cheaper, and the people who consider price only are this man's lawful prey.'

The second is: 'It's unwise to pay too much, but it's worse to pay too little. When you pay too much, you lose a little money – that's all. When you pay too little, you sometimes lose everything, because the thing you bought was incapable of doing the thing it was bought to do. The common law of business balance prohibits paying a little and getting a lot – it can't be done. If you deal with the lowest bidder, it is well to add something for the risk you run, and if you do that you will have enough to pay for something better.'

I am sure Solomon may have said the above quotes in fewer words.

#### Worship activities for families

Saturday Families Church runs fortnightly on Saturday mornings in the main hall, a play and worship session for families with children up to around aged 9. We have plenty of equipment, so we can always get something different out when

we are joined by an older child. Besides the ride-on toys for toddlers, lego, trainset and Octonauts, we usually offer a craft activity like sandart, clay or painting, and often make a picture or model linked to our bible story. And we use the garden when possible. The coffee bar is open until tidy-up



time when we gather for worship. We enjoy singing and dancing to 'If God loves you and you know it, clap your hands' with the tambourine, telling the bible story with pictures and questions, and some lively worship choruses from the 1980s on the big TV, including some songs with actions. During the prayers this week, we dipped our fingers in water and signed crosses on the world beach ball, as a response to hearing how Philip had baptised the Ethiopian official after explaining about Jesus in the chariot on the road to Gaza. The children engage best through pictures and having something to do.

On the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday each month, we hold FamilyWorship in the LH in parallel to adult morning worship. A forty minute service, it follows a traditional structure, but with more visual aids and participation, and everything short and easy to follow in plain English for younger people. And then we relax over some crafts or games. Usually we get some awkward questions and bad jokes to think about from Spiko the Sunday monkey, and a challenge to our bible knowledge in the quiz. And we are learning bible memory verses in sign language with Jenni. This service is not exclusive to families – so if you feel like a change, do come and join in! However, we are keen to keep the critical mass of youngsters which gives the service its atmosphere – so don't all come on the same day and outnumber them!

We also enjoyed an All Age service with the adult congregation on Palm Sunday on the theme of justice. We mentioned Emmeline Pankhurst who founded the suffragette movement, one of the leading campaigners who enabled women over 21 to be granted the vote in 1928. We should also have mentioned Emily Davison who threw herself under the king's horse in June 1913 at the Epsom Derby, and died of her injuries.

Last year we re-named our other Sunday morning sessions as Young People's Church, which is inclusive of everyone from 3 up to age 18 (who wants to join us - they are welcome to stay in church if they prefer). The label of 'Junior Church' doesn't work now lots of our youngsters are ages 10 and over. We currently organise sessions on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sundays of the month, which include a bible reading and discussion often from the Roots material, alongside some activities or craft, and having fun together. Families seem to be busier than ever, alongside the unpredictability of illnesses, so we never know which youngsters to expect on any week. But over the year, most of them get to know each other, especially if they attend some of our other events. Doing church together, we learn a lot from each other across the ages and ability range, which is a different experience from school where classes are all the same age. We are as inclusive as we feel confident to be, and usually encourage a parent to stay in the session with us if we can't cater well enough for their child. As ever, in church we are about sharing our experiences of faith together, and the Word of God meets us in the conversation and activities besides through reading the bible passage. It's always special to watch one of the older children leading a little one out to play.

All of the above depends on willing volunteers, so if there is anyone else who would like to offer some support, do let Wendy know. Tel 07904 517384



#### The Good Life

What a lot there is to celebrate - you looking forward to a new minister and for us...all the glitches have been ironed out and there are just finishing touches needed for us to be well and truly open! The skylarks are back (that is the name of the shepherds hut) so the timing is perfect! It just needs a few pots of flowers to make them look more homely and we are ready to go.



One of the last things to be tested was the hot tub which as you can see I took every advantage of once the water was heated. You do need to use that paddle though. I made the mistake of thinking once the water was warm at the top it was all warm and discovered as I got in and quickly sat down, that the bottom half was still cold and the paddle was to stir the water to get an even spread of

temperature. After a bit of furious paddling all was well.

It has been a rather hectic two months with a lot to do and in the middle of it all

Roger fell in love with a dog called Zoe so she has joined the family. She is a Retriever/ Husky cross - not one of their intentional hybrids that are becoming all the rage - or maybe we should start a trend and call her a Huskever! She is 16 months old and is running poor Oscar ragged - but he does enjoy her company. We had her booked in to be spayed according to the information we were given



from her previous owner but she first of all had a phantom pregnancy and then on the 2nd occasion came into season so you can imagine the fun and games that has caused. Hopefully third time lucky. All this has interrupted her training but she is calming down now she has made herself at home.

One thing we did discover was that she has a high prey drive and Chanty's chickens lost a few feathers before we raised the stock fence between the garden and the paddock. They survived to tell the tale but were rather indignant at being put back in the run for their safety as they had only just been let out after 6 months in the ruin because of Avian Flu.

Garden work is in full swing and there are a number of project still on the list. Getting the vegetables planted and the planting the guilds under the fruit trees are the more urgent tasks at the moment.

The 'Guilds' are an idea from permaculture that encourages the planting of various herbs, vegetables, flowers and fruits to attract the right insects and repel those that cause harm. Last year we prepared them by creating a circle under the trees edged by bricks and now I am planting the mix of suggested plants. It is also suggested that daffodils are planted around the outside of the drip line of the tree as they repel early insects that can cause harm and attract bees. There are already some aphids on the plum tree so hopefully we will see a difference when they are all in bloom.

This got me thinking about the need to add some protection and encouragement in our own lives. What do we have in our gardens that help when life's pests come along and cause difficulties? Gratitude is one of my favourites. Finding three things to say thank you for every day or an even better suggestion I read and try to do each night is to look back over they day and think of the things that have been good, wholesome, encouraging or have made me smile and to thank God for those blessings before you go to sleep. It makes a difference to my dreams and to how I feel when I wake up in the morning. I was glad to be reminded of this after a winter of infections and injury, this practice and the warmer weather did a lot to rebalance my equilibrium!

A useful asset in our own garden guilds!

Well the garden calls so I must go and get on. If you would like a few days away and want to try out the shepherds hut then you are more than welcome - we are taking bookings! Or if you know anyone who is a keen gardener who would like a week's holiday in exchange for a couple of hours



garden work a day please send them in our direction.
