resurrection, and ultimately, in God, we discover that there is far more yet to come, and that more is filled with hope, with joy, and with life. This is what Easter means for us. This is why we can, and why we should, celebrate!

So, let us go forth as Easter people and seek to proclaim the good news of the resurrection as we share the love, peace, and joy of our God. As Brian Wren writes,

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing.
The cross stands empty to the sky.
Let streets and homes with praises ring.
Love, drowned in death, shall never die.

May the joy of the risen Christ be with you.

The Gift that keeps giving

I'm writing this on the day after
Mothering Sunday having received
flowers and cards at a family gathering.
The subject of receiving 'gifts' reminded
me of the bible texts about King Solomon.

In 1 Kings we read of the dream of

Solomon in which God says to him 'Ask whatever you want me to give to you.' What an offer! Some may well have asked for wealth, health and happiness, but Solomon, recognising his lack of experience for the task ahead of him, asked for 'A discerning heart' —or in other words **Wisdom**. Consequently, God recognising his humility, gave Solomon more than he dreamed of and gave him not only wisdom but wealth and honour. In Proverbs 3: 14-35 we are told that 'Wisdom is worth more than silver; it makes you richer than gold; it is more valuable than precious jewels'

When we receive gifts they are a reminder to us of the giver and we give thanks. Following Jesus' crucifixion the disciples were likewise, reminded of his promises to them. They were told to tarry a while in Jerusalem until you are endued with power from on high.' What did they expect? What kind of power? What would be expected of them? Would they become highly renowned, wealthy, great leaders? Or were they remembering the warnings that Christ gave them about rejection and suffering?

While they waited they we can be sure that would be very afraid of a backlash from the authorities and the people. They would meet together in secret and discuss what may happen next. And what did happen was even more than their wildest imaginings could have predicted – more than they dreamed of.

At Pentecost we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples - and through them *the gifts of the Spirit* throughout the Church on Earth. Unlike the flowers that fade and the chocs that are eaten the gifts of the Spirit are unfailing.

Synod

Did you know our church is one of 130 grouped together in the URC Thames North Synod? which includes some churches in London, Herts, Beds and Essex and one or two in Berkshire. The Synod has a small team of paid people to support us all and some committees which depend on volunteers. Synod convenes two or three meetings every year for representatives of all the churches to meet together for mutual encouragement and inspiration, attended by some of the ministers and lots of Church Elders and other volunteer representatives. And in March I got invited to attend, and tell them a little bit about our church involvement with families and children and young people. There were four of us being interviewed by the Synod Childrens and Youth Enabler, Lorraine, representative of 10 paid workers employed by different churches within the synod. I gave them an overview of my role, and told them about Saturday Families Church, and how we had built up participation by meeting people through our toddler and babygroups. It was quite a contrast to the work of the two youth leaders whose large London churches are able to run mid-week childrens and youthgroups, and to the childrensworker who is employed to help run a Sunday morning club for 8 to 10 junior aged children the grandchildren of the 15-strong congregation of much older people, plus their schoolfriends. The organisers were hoping to encourage more churches to apply for grants to fund posts like ours. And several people asked me questions over lunch so hopefully it helped.

We met in the Lumen Church near King's Cross, which has been developed to include a café space fronting the road, and has wonderful stained glass and a lofty tower which lifted the worship. Some churches were present on zoom, including our own Philip Read, and then Matthew turned up in person for the afternoon session.

During the day there were various committee reports, and updates on the work of different aspects of discipleship and church life, and there was a passionate presentation and debate about the retirement age of ministers — currently mandated by age 68. So a resolution was put forward to the URC national assembly requesting a process to allow ministers to continue working as long as they desire and are able, in review with their congregations.

In 2022 the research organisation Theos conducted a survey and in-depth study of URC churches and has written a report to answer the question, 'What does it look like when URC churches flourish?' The report title is 'URC: A paradoxical church at a crossroads' and it's available for just the postage from the URC online bookshop. So we had some time in small groups to discuss some of the findings in the report, and our Synod will be using the findings to help shape the future of the support they provide for churches.

There was also a lively presentation by Roo from JPIT (the Joint Public Issues Team) about the need to encourage people to vote in the general election and local elections. It seems many people are disengaged, and some disenfranchised because they don't know how to vote or think it won't make any difference. But EVERY vote counts! So we are all encouraged to vote ourselves and encourage our friends and family members.

ELECTIONS

I don't think that I'm spreading fake news if I say that there will be a general election this year, although technically the date could just slip into 2025. However, there are local elections coming up, and polling day will be Thursday, 2 May.

I have no wish to tell you how you should vote, but I would urge everyone to exercise their right to vote, because there are many places where this basic right is denied. I do believe that you don't have much cause to moan if you didn't vote. Your vote should be secret, and there are many couples who still take the trouble to vote, but half suspecting that their votes will cancel each other's out.

At a recent United Reformed Church (URC) Thames North Synod gathering, a representative from 'head office' at Church House spoke strongly about how

individual Churches can help, not only their congregations, but other users of the premises too.

His talk was 'Get Ready to Vote', and I have displayed a poster in a prominent position in the Vestibule which I hope will be seen by everyone crossing our threshold.

Get registered – the majority of us will already be on the electoral roll, but if recently arrived in the area, action is needed. You can register online or with a paper form. There is one of those QR codes on the poster. It takes five minutes to fill in the form, but can take six weeks to be registered, so the advice is don't wait.

Get Voter ID — This will be the first general election where you will need to show photographic proof of identity, such as a passport, photocard driving licence, blue badge, or concessionary travel pass, even if expired, as long as it still looks like you.

If you have none of these, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate. The Joint Public Issues Team (JPIT) is here to help Churches engage with elections and with councillors and MPs.

The URC has become an ambassador of the Citizens UK Voter Registration Champions Scheme, undertaking to encourage our local communities to register to vote, to ensure they have appropriate ID, and to either go out to vote on the day or register for a postal vote.

Some will argue that the Church should not get involved in politics, but part of our calling as Christians is to engage with politics, because decisions made by the people that we vote for affect us all and the issues we care about from poverty to refugees and climate change.

Please do not be afraid to ask any of the Elders in your particular Church for help if needed; we may not know the answer immediately, but we will all do our very best to assist you in whatever way we can.

BOOK REVIEW

Here are reviews of 4 excellent (and very different books) I have read since Christmas – all recommended!

Lessons in Chemistry (Bonnie Garmus)

A fabulous book, beautifully written, which made me cry! Set in 1950s USA, in the days when women were expected to be at home, it tells of how women had to be tough to work in science, and how Elizabeth Zott found a way to tell women they could achieve so much more.

The Gates of Athens (Conn Igguldon)

This tells the story of Xerxes' Persion invasion of Greece and the Athenian-led defence from Marathon to the build-up to Salamis - a story I learned at school but told through fascinating characters, with the world's oldest democracy at the heart of the story.

Trust (Hernan Diaz)

Winner of the 2023 Pulitzer Prize and long-listed for the Booker Prize, this story about an American financier and his wife investing during the 1920s, is told by 4 different people – slightly confusing at first but well worth sticking with to the end.

The Silence of the Girls (Pat Barker)

This is the Trojan Wars told by one of the women affected by the Greek invasion and fighting – all the heroes are seen from her perspective and it really shows war from the victims' view. It really shows how little change there has been over the centuries!

Sarah Connor (Harpenden)

Gnocchi with mushrooms, spinach, bacon and poached egg

I subscribe to two cooking magazines, <u>Good Food</u> and <u>Olive</u>, and every month I fold down the pages of recipes I like the look of and then happily put the magazines on my bookshelf and forget all about them. When I look through them again, there are always recipes I've marked which are a bit different to my normal tastes, and I'm fairly certain I will never make them. This is one of those recipes, and this week I decided I was just going to go for it. If I didn't like it, I could just not make it again. But I did like it. A lot.

This is so simple, fresh tasting and actually rather pretty. The original recipe is vegetarian and I was tempted to leave it as such, but I couldn't resist adding bacon. I'm sure, though, that it would be yummy without, so make this veggie if you want to.

Gnocchi with mushrooms, spinach, bacon and poached egg

Adapted from Olive October 2011

Serves 2

Ingredients:

a little olive oil, for frying

15g butter

3 slices back bacon, sliced

250g chestnut mushrooms, sliced

1 garlic clove, crushed

100g baby spinach

black pepper, to season

250g gnocchi (I used bought fresh, 3-4 minutes cooking time)

2 large, very fresh eggs

Heat the olive oil in a large frying pan over a medium-high heat and add the bacon. Fry until cooked through and then add the black pepper, mushrooms, garlic and butter. Fry until the mushrooms have softened, then turn the heat to low and wilt the spinach in while you cook the gnocchi and eggs.

Fill two large pans with boiling water and add a pinch of salt to each. In one pan, pour in the gnocchi. In the other pan, poach the eggs. I used gnocchi which took 3-4 minutes to cook, which was just the right amount of time for the eggs.

My method for poaching eggs (which I learnt from my nan) is to use a slotted spoon and stir the water in the pan quite quickly until it creates a sort of whirlpool. Quickly break an egg into the middle of whirlpool. It should cling together and begin to cook immediately, at which point you can push it gently to the side and create the whirlpool again. Alternatively, poach them one at a time.

Once the gnocchi is cooked, drain it and toss it in the pan with the bacon, mushrooms and spinach. Divide between two plates and add a poached egg to the top of each. Serve immediately.


