Dear Friends,

Grace and peace to you.

There is a well-known English expression that is alleged, without any apparent basis, to have originated as a Chinese curse. The expression is, "May you live in interesting times."

Wikipedia states that,

While seemingly a blessing, the expression is normally used ironically; life is better in "uninteresting times" of peace and tranquillity than in "interesting" ones, which are usually times of trouble.

It seems to me that we could, very easily, claim to be living in "interesting times" for all sorts of reasons. The question is, how do we react to this? How do we live our lives as followers of Jesus in the midst of these "interesting times"?

I think that we best react to whatever situation we are in by, first, seeking to lean ever more on God. God is the one who knows each one of us intimately; God is the one who cares for our world, the world that he created; and God is the one who loves us so much that he sent Jesus to be both our friend and our Saviour. It is to God to whom we should turn in all moments of our lives, and not least in the midst of those times that we could describe as "interesting".

I sit and write these words a few days before the United Nations International Day of Peace, which has been marked on the 21<sup>st</sup> September each year since 1982. And as I write I am acutely conscious of this marking of, and call for, peace which stands in stark contrast to the many situations we observe around the world. Even in the last few days we have seen the horrors inflicted by exploding pagers and walkie-talkies, and wonder what further violence, death and injury this may lead to.

When one begins to look around the world, you begin to realise just how great the need for peace is. The Geneva Academy monitors the world's armed conflicts and currently lists over 110 different armed conflicts that are being waged around the globe, most of which we know nothing about because they do not get mentioned in our news media. However, they report that there are more than 45 armed conflicts in the Middle East and North Africa; more than 35 in the rest of Africa; 21 in Asia; 7 in Europe; and 6 in Latin America.

Back in 2021, and the "interesting times" we were living in then, a young poet named Amanda Gorman spoke powerful words of hope to the world at the inauguration of President Joe Biden. Those words were specific to the situation in the United States, and yet they also had a deeper resonance that echoed much further than there. Indeed, there is much within the poem, *The Hill We Climb*, that she recited at the inauguration that resonates with our Christian faith.

For these words recognise our sinful state. She says that, *yes, we are far from polished, far from pristine,* but then she calls us to look beyond that and to look at what stands before us. As Christians, we recognise that we look at both a what <u>and</u> a who, for we look at the empty cross and the risen Lord Jesus Christ. And it is the risen Christ

who calls us to live the values of God's kingdom in our lives and seek to spread love and peace throughout our world.

And so we lift our gazes not to what stands between us,

but what stands before us.

We close the divide because we know, to put our future first,

we must first put our differences aside.

We lay down our arms so we can reach out our arms to one another.

We seek harm to none and harmony for all. Let the globe, if nothing else, say this is true: That even as we grieved, we grew. That even as we hurt, we hoped. That even as we tired, we tried. That we'll forever be tied together, victorious. Not because we will never again know defeat,

but because we will never again sow division.

May we always lift our gaze to the One who stands before us, and may we play our part in seeking not to sow division but to share love with all people and spread peace throughout both our community and our world.

She was very impressed with the size of our building and garden and the enthusiasm of the half a dozen volunteers who came to meet her.



#### Youth Night was very enjoyable

Many thanks to Allison and Wale and Lee, who helped with the first of (hopefully many) Youth Nights on a Friday in mid September, when we welcomed 8 young people aged between 11 and 15, most of whom we knew from previous events at church, plus a couple of their friends. They joined in with games and activities with each other, especially the Wii computer game rescued from Allison's loft (big thanks!), participated in a couple of short games with everyone in a circle, and listened to Wale sharing about his life as a Christian working in the Prison Service – which prompted lots of questions. And a couple of the boys made a short film clip from playdough models with the help of Lee. Please pray for the next session in October, and for the possibility of continuing the evenings longer term, perhaps with a grant to support a youthworker.

#### <u>Time to go</u>

Big thanks to everyone who has supported me with prayer, friendship, pastoral care, and finance, and all your willing volunteering during my post with our church. And especial thanks to the young people for all the FUN! I started my role at the beginning of February 2015, and am finishing in September as the main funding grant will stop very soon. And it has certainly been an emotional month of handover, clearing up and receiving good wishes. Special thanks to everyone who contributed to the large cheque I have been given, it's very generous, and thanks for the personal cards and gifts, too, I have so enjoyed opening them. And here's a photo of the wonderful flower arrangement by Margaret. All much appreciated. Hopefully, I shall still be volunteering with church events from time to time, so can see the youngsters growing up a bit more and keep up my relationships in the church. Though I shall miss leading my groups and worship events very much indeed.

So what I am going to do next? Well, God has blessed me with a new job starting September 30<sup>th</sup>. It's quite amazing as it sounds like the job has been designed just for me: as a Programme Manager, with the Anglican Diocese of Chelmsford, using my project and change portfolio management skills from my previous career to help them launch new Christian outreach in Colchester and surrounding areas. In fact 'my' area stretches from the Herts/Essex border across to Harwich which I know well, and up to Saffron Walden, and includes over 200 churches. The projects are likely to include lots of Childrens, Families and Youthwork, and potentially planting new churches in areas of new housing. So I will be working alongside clergy and other leaders to consult their teams and scope out the projects, then outline the plans to the investment board for funding. There will be some trips into Essex to meet people and see the places, and lots of email and

on-line meetings to stay in touch. They have promised it really is 9 to 5 and no week-ends, so that will be a big change for me!

Martyn will be leading Saturday Families Church forward, and the FamilyWorship@10 services when they resume in January, and big thanks to Lynn and Beth who have led junior church before in other churches and are going to offer some sessions of Young People's Church including all the communion Sundays. And Allison and Claire are continuing with Family Gamesnights....

It has been wonderful to see families getting involved in our church community, and getting to know each other. Please join me in praying for them all, and for yet more families to come in future.

#### From Pub to Pulpit

In a poll in 2021 by BBC Songs of Praise to find the Nation's Favourite hymn, 'Jerusalem' and 'How Great Thou Art' ranked first and second – and had held those positions for several years. People have many reasons for liking a hymn – maybe the words, the tune or to mark some specific event or significant moment.

It is well-known that many composers used folk tunes and popular songs as music for their hymns. Many of these tunes were sung in pubs at music halls. The composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams one of the first musicians who participated in the first 'English Folk Song' revival



and

he also used folk song tunes in his compositions. He collected his first song, 'Bushes and Briars'\*, from Mr Charles Pottipher, a seventy-yearold labourer from Ingrave, Essex, in 1903.Over a period of 30 years he recorded a number of songs – some using a phonograph but the vast majority were recorded by hand.

In 1906 he was the musical editor of the 'English Hymnal' of 1906, and the co-editor of 'Songs of Praise' of 1925 and the 'Oxford Book of Carols' of 1928, in collaboration with Percy Dearmer. In addition, he arranged many pre-existing hymn tunes and created hymn tunes based on folk songs.



Our hymn books are full of the hymns written by the great hymn-writers like Isaac Watts, Charles Wesley, Sabine Baring-Gould, Fred Kaan and Fred Pratt-Green, and latterly

hymns written by Graham Kendrick and Stephen Townend - to name but two of the very many – have been added. Over the years we have been singing hymns written to many popular pieces of music and any organist will tell you that there are several tunes which fit the same words. Among my favourites based on songs are:

I cannot tell why He whom angels worship - Londonderry Air

Spirit of God, unseen as the wind - Skye Boat Song

Our eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord - *Battle hymn of* the Republic

God is our strength and refuge – Dam busters March.

And the organist at my previous church always played 'While Shepherds watched ...' to 'On Ilkley Moor baht at' – it lasted forever!

So ... if you like a good session of hymn-singing, consider coming to Wheathampstead for the Songs of Praise afternoons – the next one being held on **Sunday 20 October at 3pm**... Oh, and there'll be cake!

The Lord is King! lift up thy voice, O earth, and all ye heavens, rejoice; from world to world the joy shall ring, The Lord omnipotent is King.

The Lord is King! who then shall dare resist His will, distrust His care, or murmur at His wise decrees, or doubt His royal promises?

He reigns! ye saints, exult your strains; your God is King, your Father reigns ; and He is at the Father's side, the Man of love, the Cruciified.

Alike pervaded by His eye all parts of His dominion lie; this world of ours, and worlds unseen, and thin the boundary between!

One Lord one empire all secures; He reigns, and life and death are yours; through earth and heaven one song shall ring, "The Lord Omnipotent is King!"

Nearly sixty four years ago Madge and I sang this hymn when we were married. I had just finished my time as a National Serviceman in the Royal Air Force serving as a 'Medic' at RAF Marham in Norfolk. Marham was then the V-Bomber Station with about 3,000 families. With Regulars and other Nation Servicemen we (that is my twin brother) worked in a 16 bed Sick-quarters, dealing with officers, and all other ranks, plus families under the control of a couple of Squadron Leaders (doctors).

But I am getting off the subject! So, back to the hymn. It was written by Josiah Conder who was born in 1789. In one way he be seen as a very fortunate child, for his father had a bookshop - I know how he must have felt for I had I over a thousand at one time! Books all over the place - shelves full, piles on the floors!

At a time when the vast masses had little opportunity for education, let alone possess a book. Josiah was to be envied. But then something happened to him that nobody could envy: an inoculation against smallpox destroyed the sight in his right eye! But like most young children their resilience is remarkable, and Josiah gave himself to learning as much as he could. He later was educated at a Dissenting Academy. At the age of 21 he took over his father's business, followed by marriage. Josiah wrote many books but his greatest achievement was the editing of the Congregational Hymn Book- which sold over 90,000 copies in the first few years of publication.


