So my father and I ended up having a packed day of services as follows:

- 1. 8am: listened to the local radio service.
- 2. 11am: Zoom service with our old URC group
- 3. 12-30pm: Harpenden service on Youtube
- 4. 3pm: Harvest Festival at Middle Lambrook

We just needed an Evensong service to go to to finish off the day! In normal times we all donate fruit and vegetables to be auctioned for charity at a harvest sale and buffet supper on the Monday night as well as items for the local Lord's

Larder in Yeovil, but this year (as was also the case last year) we decided to cancel the harvest sale and just take goods for the Lord's Larder. Hopefully the situation will be better next harvest and we'll be able to go back to having a social occasion, but for now we decided that 20-25 folk packed into our smallish hall behind the chapel was not the best idea.

On the farm, calving has finished and bales of straw have been collected from a neighbouring arable farmer's field. So we are now looking at the various other, largely harvesting, jobs that need doing before the weather turns. This last week I have been digging our half-acre of potatoes. Also, some store cattle have been separated off for market and others (heifers) have joined the group of cows and calves in readiness for October when an Aberdeen Angus bull will hopefully arrive! I keep looking at the apple and pear trees in the orchard to see what size harvest from them might be forth-coming. I think it will be quality rather than quantity this year, but sufficient to see us good for desserts for a few months over the winter.

Down at Sandwich, Sarah and Rose have weathered the recent influx of golfers, but apparently it wasn't too bad as the majority of traffic was diverted away from the centre of the town which has streets so narrow that they have to be one-way only! So now things are back to normal, with Rose having started her second year at school and Sarah working hard in the lab where she tests samples of wheat and potatoes sent in by the companies that process them.

At Harvest we remember God's hand in providing us with all our food but we can also think of our personal harvests of love and friendship, of peace and joy, and of times when God has been there for us in times of trouble. We cannot quantify these things as we might count bags of potatoes or boxes of apples, but we can rejoice and praise God for what their provision means to us.

When asked 'how are you', it is not unusual to respond, 'I am fine'. It is a phrase I have tried to avoid using, and have been very cautious about saying, since being

presented with an acronym for FINE at a workshop many years ago. I endeavour now to take a moment to talk to someone a little more when they say, 'I am fine'.

Fine is an appropriate term to use when someone has expressed a concern about another's health. Its subsidiary meaning in this context is healthy and well, not sick or injured. However, it may not always be a synonym for good, well or OK, it can be a secret code.

The acronym typically stands for Freaked out, Insecure, Neurotic and Emotional, or 'Feelings Inside Not Expressed'.

The words we use convey so much more meaning that what we are actually saying. I have seen and heard Freaked out being replaced with Fed up, Frustrated and Frantic, and Neurotic replaced with Numb and Needy. When *bereaved* FINE could mean Feeling Insecure, Numb and Empty. When *struggling* FINE could mean Feeling Inadequate and Needing Encouragement.

When *encouraged* FINE could mean Finding Inspiration Now Everywhere. When *enthusiastic* FINE could mean Free, Independent, New and Energetic. When *feeling great* FINE could mean Fabulous, Intelligent, Nice and Exceptional. When *desperate* FINE could mean Frantic, Insane, Nuts and Egotistical. When *celebrating* FINE could mean Festive, Inspired, Nervous yet Excited. If used at the end of an argument, when a person feels they are right but cannot stand to argue any more, it simply could mean that **you should be quiet.**






