

Easter Greetings from the United Reformed Church!

The Revd John Proctor, general secretary of the United Reformed Church, offers the following Easter reflection:

Everyone loves an Easter egg. Doing things with eggs is part of the season – cream and chocolate, hard-boiled and decorated, hidden and hunted

down. There is a reason we make so much of eggs at Easter. They are a visible and edible reminder of the stone on Jesus' grave. They speak of the first Easter and of what happened then. The original stone was not quite egg-shaped. Think instead of a heavy disc, like a giant coin, able to roll from left to right, with a groove to guide its path. And Easter turns the stone, to a new position and a new angle. It turns a lot of other things too. Easter is about vindication – setting the world the right way up. Easter vindicates Jesus. Who was this man? Healer? Prophet? Maverick? Criminal? Tragic hero? Dead loss? Easter says 'more' to some of these thoughts, and 'no' to others. Because of Easter, the cross was real but not final. At Easter, the healer overcame not only disease but death as well. The rising of the prophet Jesus speaks back to all that decays and destroys our world. Easter says that the values and beliefs for which Jesus stood and spoke are sure enough and strong enough to last. They do not die with him. He lives and so do they. So Easter vindicates justice. It says that cruelty and anger will not have the last word on earth. When corruption and cowardice have done their worst, their worst will be undone. The hardships and hurts we humans inflict on one another shall be judged and healed. The world can be a dirty, damaging and dismal place, but its smears, scars and shadows will not endure. Easter points to a future of hope and justice. The God who raised Jesus will not abandon this weary earth. We believe in justice, in a world turned right side up, because we believe in the risen Jesus. And Easter vindicates joy. So much in this world tests our peace of mind, makes us hang our heads in sorrow, and sours our experience of living. Easter lifts our spirit. It raises our eyes in hope, and calms our hearts when fear waits at the door. Because Jesus lives we can trust, we can work confidently for justice, we can praise, and we have right and reason to rejoice. A world turned right way up, rolled into a new alignment. Jesus lives. Justice is coming. Joy is ours. Happy Easter!

He is risen

New Testament: Acts 10.34-43

Invited by Cornelius to speak the words that God had given him to say, Peter gives a clear and concise summary of Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

'We are witnesses to all that he did' (v.39), Peter says, confirming first-hand that Jesus rose on the third day and subsequently appeared to his disciples, eating and drinking with them. It is the testimony of those first disciples that perhaps offers the strongest proof of Jesus' resurrection. Given their levels of fear and confusion immediately after Jesus' death, what else could explain their sudden transformation into joyful and confident ambassadors of the gospel?

New Testament: 1 Corinthians 15.19-26

In 1 Corinthians 15, Paul examines both the facts of the resurrection and its meaning for us. He describes it as a new era in the history of salvation. The era of Adam, in which all human beings die, has ended. Now, in Christ, 'all will be made alive' (v.22). Jesus' resurrection paves the way for the eventual resurrection of all who belong to him. Paul writes with the unshakeable confidence of someone who has encountered the risen Christ himself. Earlier in the chapter he lists over 500 people who saw Christ after his resurrection. Then, 'last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me' (15.8). For Paul, the Damascus road was a life-changing moment that gave him a new understanding of God, and a new sense of his own calling. Our experiences are probably less dramatic, but how have we encountered the risen Christ, and how has this changed our lives?

Gospel: Luke 24.1-12

The names may differ, but all the Gospels agree that the first witnesses of the empty tomb were the women who followed Jesus to the cross, and then to his grave. Luke describes them as 'perplexed'. Having brought spices to anoint Jesus' body, they clearly weren't anticipating the resurrection. But as soon as the mysterious men in dazzling clothes remind them that Jesus had predicted he would rise again (Luke 9.22), they rush back into the city to tell the disciples and

the rest of Jesus' followers that he has risen. Mary Magdalene has been called the 'apostle to the apostles', but she is not the only one. All the women Luke lists in verse 10 could bear that title. Ironically, the apostles initially disbelieve them, perhaps because women were not considered to be reliable witnesses under Jewish law. But the women's faithfulness at the end of the Gospel mirrors that of Elizabeth and Mary at the beginning. Throughout his Gospel, Luke consistently shows women, as well as men, proclaiming the good news of our salvation in Christ.

Peter then sees the empty tomb for himself. Rather curiously, 'then he went home, amazed at what had happened' (v.12). We do not see him immediately bearing witness, as the women had. The story of the Emmaus road intervenes, and it is only as that story ends that we hear that Peter has told the rest of Jesus' followers. Perhaps he needed time to process his amazement.

'You are witnesses of these things' (Luke 24.48), Jesus says. As the Gospel ends, Jesus commissions all his followers (not just the eleven) to proclaim his death and resurrection to all nations, along with the message of repentance and the forgiveness of sins. As we celebrate the joy of Easter, we are invited to reflect on our own role as witnesses, and to be encouraged that the Spirit will inspire and empower us to proclaim the good news.

The links between the readings

Some proclaim the resurrection hesitantly. Some proclaim it with great confidence and certainty. The Easter readings suggest that it took some time for the Early Church to process the amazing reality of Jesus' resurrection. Peter (in Acts) and Paul (in 1 Corinthians) were among the first to see the full implications of Christ's victory over the powers of sin and death. But from the moment that the women first discovered the empty tomb, the resurrection brought new life and energy and hope into the world. This was stunningly good news that simply had to be shared – and it still does.

Secretary's Notes

The Worship Team invited Andrew Mulligan from Mission India to preach on Sunday 17th March and tell us about the Mission work taking place in India today. We were treated to an insight into Andrew's life from growing up in Derry, planting Churches in Manchester and Milton Keynes and now working for Mission India.

He visited India on four separate occasions but he turned down God's calling feeling inadequate for the task as he didn't speak any of the

languages. Finally he agreed as God wasn't going to give up and he joined Mission India.

India is a country where millions will live and die not knowing about Jesus without the work of Mission India.

Their work is in partnership with Christian Indian Nationals providing training and teaching to Indians. On completion of the years course they



are equipped to bring to the poorest villages the love of Christ Jesus, education and ultimately a church building for worship.

The Retiring Collection for Mission India raised £182.

Thank you all for your generosity and support for this worthy cause.

This set me thinking about two things

1) How many of us respond to messages or requests sent by God and do we recognise them as coming from God?

I have been aware that twice in the last two weeks I have experienced God's encouragement for me to act.

I sent flowers from church to Eileen as we had not seen her for sometime only to discover she had recently returned from Australia where she had a fall, ended up in hospital, needed her son to accompany her on the long flight home and is still recovering.

I delivered flowers to Tim and Wendy on Sunday to discover Tim is back in hospital.

Why did I decide to give these flowers to these people? I believe it was a prompt from God.

If we are open and listen for God's prompting we can be moved to take action. We may not be called for great mission work but we can make a difference to the lives of those around us.

2) How many of us are willing to share our faith in our everyday lives? Why do so many of us find this so difficult?

Martyn MacPhee used a quote in his last Sermon comparing Christians to a typical swimming pool. Crowded at the shallow end with very few in the deeper water. I think this is true of many of us who are Christians today. We are happy in an environment where we feel confident and comfortable to speak of our faith. A place where we don't feel out of our depth or in the deep end of the swimming pool .We are reluctant to share our faith in places where we might find ourselves being challenged.

We all need to be sharing God's love for all his people in our everyday lives so let's try to be less timid about our faith. Let's stop confining our sharing to the safety of our Church building, study groups and amongst friends who already share our faith. Let's make an effort to get out of the shallow end of the swimming pool.

We must **Let Our Light Shine** and we can start by being visible at the Service in Howardsgate at 11am on Good Friday. See you all there.

How many more?' A response to knife crime



(URC) Related Community Worker (CRCW) for Grassroots – a Luton-based ecumenical charity that supports community work through its involvement with the Bury Park Beech Hill Council of Churches (BPBHCC) – reflects on the tragic and violent loss of teenagers due to knife crime.

Karen's poem is a response to a *Huffington Post* article that lays bare harsh statistics which shows across London 'the victims, and perpetrators [of knife crime], are mainly poor, and they are disproportionately black.'

For years, the families of murdered teenagers have appealed for more to be done to tackle the violence, and gang grooming, but to no avail.

In the year to March 2018, knife killings in England and Wales rose by 34% to a 72-year high.

Karen asks:

One more for the statistics;
One more laboured sigh;
One more half-hearted pause;
One more half-hearted 'Why?'

One more young life is wasted -Countless futures torn apart; One more fam'ly shattered; One more mother's broken heart. One more damning indictment Against the problem boys

One more time to turn our face away;


One more issue to let slide - As long as trouble doesn't knock *my* door So many truths denied.

In January 2018, Baroness Doreen Lawrence, mother of Stephen Lawrence who was stabbed to death in a racist attack in 1993, predicted that if more victims were white, only then would knife crime be taken more seriously.

The Revd Dr Michael Jagessar, URC Secretary for Global and Intercultural Ministries, says: 'Following the tragic, violent, and senseless deaths of two teenagers – Jodie Chesney on 1 March, in Havering, and Yousef Ghaleb Makkie, on 2 March, in Greater Manchester – there are now high-profile calls for a knife tsar, increased policing, a petition for a Royal Commission to improve and protect policing, and Savid Javid MP, the Home Secretary, to make plans with police chiefs from the parts of the UK most affected by knife crime.

'This is the response needed for these tragic situations, yet it leaves many wondering why this suggested action was not taken before?

'All of these young lives matter. I pray that the response needed to tackle the violence is appropriate, addresses the systemic issues and is far-reaching so that no more lives will be lost in this senseless way.'

Community Outreach

Thank you for all the plastic bags we received. We are continuously blessed with trolley-loads of food donations from Sainsbury's and so unfortunately have used all the plastic bags we received. Should you have any extra plastic bags that you no longer need, please drop them off in the Foodbank basket, at the back of the Church. Thanks so much.

The Zion Foodbank is in its tenth year and gives out about 500 items of food per week. I was privileged to be invited for coffee and biscuits by them a few weeks ago, to hear about their history.

I have written a module on 'Health & Safety in the Kitchen' which Wendy and I will be covering in a workshop within the next few months with our lovely volunteers, who help in the Community Cafe' and at Breakfast Church. The module also includes food handling policies. I will also be inviting the volunteers from the Cellar Club. The module covers some of the items I learnt when I did my Health & Safety Certificate.

I attended a Community Inclusion Partnership meeting on 14 February. We had a presentation on the update of Universal Credit and a presentation about a draft proposal for the Housing, Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Strategy.

I also attended a Mission Champions Day in London hosted by HOPE. They explained that there could be several Mission Champions in a congregation. Their roles may include:

- Encouraging fellow church members to be involved in serving others in their community and making Christ known through their love and practical service. This can be done through hospitality and creating events (e.g. Easter Service, Harvest Festival etc) which are wonderful ways of creating awareness and inviting people into the church who usually do not attend.
- Motivating fellow church members to pray for their community, to speak about their faith with new confidence, to give of themselves in service, to give appropriate literature or other resources to their unchurched friends
