Dear Friends,

Grace and peace to you.

February is often a month in which people like to think about love. Often the focus is specifically on romantic love because St. Valentine's Day falls in the middle of the month. This day has become a focus for love over the years, and that only seems to be increasing with the amount of commercial activity and products that we see each year.

Yet, we know that there is more to love than what we see represented on television, in our newspapers, and on Valentine's Day cards. Romantic love is a wonderful and joyful thing, but it is only but one example of the whole spectrum that love fills.

And we find this illustrated throughout our Scriptures as we read about how God is the very essence of love, how God loves us, and how we are called to respond to that love in the way that we live our lives.

John expresses all this clearly in his first letter when he writes,

Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.

Paul defines something of what loving one another means in his great praise of love that we know so well from his first letter to the church in Corinth. In that passage he reminds us that,

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

Here we see it expressed clearly what love truly means. Love is not expressed through anger, envy, bitterness, or greed, but is demonstrated through patience, kindness, grace, and trust. It is the expression of the very being of God, and when we know God and are filled with His Holy Spirit then our lives should be guided by that same love.

And should we ever doubt the love that God has for us, then we need only to look at what John tells us in his gospel. Words that are very familiar to us, but words that should never lose their power or beauty.

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

This is God's love fully demonstrated for us. Love that has no limit. Love that is deeper and truer than anything we could ever imagine. "Love divine," as Charles Wesley reminds us, "all loves excelling." And love that, as Isaac Watts so powerfully puts it, "demands my soul, my life, my all."

February falls neatly between the celebrations of Christmas and Easter, which seems to be a good time to remind ourselves about the love of God. God who comes to us in Jesus at Christmas, and God who dies for us on the cross and is raised to life again at Easter to reveal the wonder of His love and set us free.

May we rejoice in God's love and seek to live our lives in ways that reflect that love to everyone around us.

News from Wheathampstead

Looking forward to 2025 as it gets well underway. We have had our first Churches Together meeting with the Anglican and Catholic Churches in the village and planned early year activities, Week of Prayer for Christian Unity worship, World Day of Prayer, Lent Groups to be arranged, Good Friday Procession and churchyard service among others.

We have been a homeless church again for a month whilst the halls have had massive work taking place to improve the heating after receiving a Government Energy Efficiency Grant of £73,000. We found out that we had received the grant in November2024 and the work to be completed by 14 February 2025! With many challenges along the way this is now nearly completed. The hall has had all the inside outside walls insulated and is in the process of being redecorated. Air source heat pumps have been installed and we have solar panels fitted to the church roof. Also, the flat roofs at either end of the hall building have been replaced, so hopefully no more leaks! We are looking forward to welcoming you to our 'warm' building before the winter is out! Songs of praise to be held at 3pm on 16 March will be a good opportunity.

We have some extremely bad news to tell of our organist of many years, Gill Chapman, after appearing to recover well from an operation three years ago she fell ill again in November which was assumed to be a virus. Seeming to recover from this she attended our Community kitchen dinner before Christmas with her husband Brian but the day before Christmas was admitted to hospital and after lots of investigations was discharged home, after a short time she was given the bad news that she was seriously ill and sadly passed away peacefully on the 21st January. We will miss her so much as she has been so loyal to us. When our church closed in 2012 and the organ was taken to pieces and made its way to a new life at a church in Poland she stayed and played whatever instrument was available and has continued to do this all these years.

Looking forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the Pastorate Service on Mothering Sunday, 30 March, at Harpenden. Hopefully some of you will be able to join us for our Songs of Praise on 16 March, please let us know of any hymns you would like to be included.

DEFIBRILLATOR

The Church Road side of WGC town centre is not well served by defibrillators sited in public spaces, and available for use 24/7 in emergencies. The closest to the Church is listed on an app. as being outside Snappy Snaps about 350 metres away. Perhaps some nearer premises may have a defibrillator indoors for use when open to customers. Perhaps, this is something that the Church could consider saving money; in other words, only available when the Church is open.

The alternative is one sited on the outside and illuminated and expenditure is estimated to be in the region of £2,000 plus on-going costs. Planning permission is required because the Church is in a conservation area and anything which alters the external appearance needs permission. However, this obstacle has already been cleared.

Accordingly, the Eldership has given the go ahead, with some donations already pledged and a British Heart Foundation grant a possibility.

Once installed, the location will be added to 'Find a Defibrillator' apps.

If you feel inclined to support this appeal, any donation sealed in an envelope and marked 'Defibrillator' and popped into the Sunday collection will find its way into the fund. Please have a word with me in respect of donations that can be Gift Aided. Thank you.

And here's a South African word to ponder: The longest official word ever from the nation was the 80-letter tongue twister



The beautiful colours changing moment by moment as the shades of night were scattered by the brightness of the dawn. Then she read in Psalm 139, verse 17 and 18 these words: "How precious to me are your thoughts, O God! How vast is the sum of them! If I would count them, they are more than the sand. I awake and am still with you." (English Standard Version.) Harriet's reaction was to write one of the most sublime and beautiful hymns ever written.

Still, still with Thee — when purple morning breaketh, when the bird waketh and the shadows flee; Fairer than morning, lovelier than daylight, Dawns the sweet consciousness—I am with Thee!

Alone with Thee amid the mystic shadows, The solemn hush of nature newly born; Alone with Thee in breathless adoration, In the calm dew and freshness of the morn.

Still, still with Thee—as to each new-born morning A fresh and solemn splendour still is given; So doth this blessed consciousness, awaking Breathe each day nearness unto Thee and heav'n!

So shall it be at last in that bright morning, When the soul waketh and life's shadows flee; O in that hour, fairer than daylight dawning, Shall rise the glorious thought—I am with Thee!

Let us just look back and see what she is doing! First of all she is thirteen years of age. And very bright!

It is a Sunday and, as usual, Harriet is perched on her pew listening to her father preach. It isn't one of his usual sermons - taking a text of Scripture and dealing with doctrine, it was a passage, like a parable, which was more open to his gift of extemporaneous preaching. As he spoke Harriet, somehow, felt different- she felt

God was speaking to her. After the service was over, she went straight home and waited for her father to arrive. All excited she threw her arms around him as he came into the house, and said, "Father! I gave my life to Jesus!"

Was it real? Harriet's life showed it was real! She was an ardent anti-slavery activist. She wrote many novels on social issues but her story, Uncle Tom's Cabin sold thousands upon thousands in America, Great Britain, and across the World. If you haven't read it, treat yourself to a copy!




