Secretary's Notes



Above is a Nativity picture that we are all familiar with the Christmas card depiction of the coming of Christ into our world with everyone in place.

Jesus birth is the underlying reason for Christmas celebrations although the true meaning has been lost over time by those who have drifted away from Christian belief in today's world. Many will recognise this picture, what it represents, and who the people in the picture are but will celebrate Christmas without acknowledging or giving thanks for its true meaning and significance. Christmas has become for many associated only with family get togethers, presents, feasts and parties.

Above all the elements of the Christmas story are brought together to tell the story in a single image but it is doubtful that all these people were altogether honouring Jesus birth. As a child I accepted that this was exactly as it happened but in recent years I have begun to reflect on the Christmas Story differently and I would like to share my thoughts.

Let me start with Mary a young girl betrothed to Joseph but still living at home in a small community at a time when women were looked upon as simply wives and mothers beholden to their husbands. I am sure she would have been afraid not knowing how to tell Joseph and her parents or how the villagers would react to her pregnancy. I am sure they would be doubting her explanation that she was carrying God's son and perhaps ridicule her for inventing such a story to cover her shame. Yet her faith in God encouraged her to accept that he had chosen her, confident he would be with her through all the difficulties she would be sure to encounter.

Joseph must have found it hard to accept her story and I am sure his first thoughts were that she had been unfaithful to him. He had decided to quietly break off the engagement

until an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a vision confirming Mary's story. Joseph was a man who must have had great faith in God as he decided to do as he had been asked and stand by Mary. This was a very noble and selfless act by Joseph who would become the earthly father to this special child. It must have been a daunting prospect for Joseph especially as he was to become a father for the first time without previous experience to draw on. He would be subjected to criticism from his friends and neighbours for letting himself be drawn into Mary's mess along with the gossip which would be going on in the village. I am sure they found Mary's version of events unbelievable.

Mary's parents must also have been people of great faith in God as a pregnancy out of wedlock would have been a disgrace to the family in their community. We are not told in the bible if they also had an angel visit them in a vision, perhaps they did.

Living under the rule of the Roman Empire they were forced to make a journey to Bethlehem to enrol on a census as this was the city of Joseph's birth. This could not have happened at a worse time as Mary was almost full term. Those who have experienced pregnancy will appreciate how difficult, tiring and uncomfortable this journey must have been especially in these ancient times. On arrival tired hungry and weary they were to find the only place for rest and shelter was a stable alongside the animals. If that wasn't difficult enough Mary then goes into labour giving birth to her first child without her mother present to offer comfort, support and reassurance. How frightening this must have been for them both. I am sure they prayed to God during this time until the baby was safely delivered and both mother and baby were well.

The Angels take news of the birth to shepherds who were in the fields sleeping alongside the sheep they were looking after as they did night after night. They were not held in high regard within their community, they would have been dirty, smelly and not most people's first choice to visit a king. Yet it was God's choice they be welcomed and in Jesus ministry we see this again and again him reaching out to the fringes of society.

The star was used by God to guide the Wise men on their journey to find the King. All three were waiting for a sign that this King had been born so set out to follow it. We are unsure if they all started out from the same place or met up with each other along the way but know that their journey took a long time and Jesus and his family were probably back at home before the wise men visited bearing expensive gifts. They could not have been at the stable in Bethlehem along with the shepherds as our picture shows.

Our idyllic Nativity picture when unpicked can give us much food for thought. It was the strength and faith of Mary, Joseph and their families that enabled Jesus God's son to be brought into our world in human form and we owe them our gratitude and admiration for their courage and conviction. They suffered but believed that God would be with them through all the trials and tribulations they would face. He didn't let them down. The dirty unworthy shepherds were welcomed in to see the newly born King. The wise men believed

in the prophesy that a new king was to be born and recognised the star was the sign they were waiting for and followed it in faith.

We all have challenges to face in our lives but if we have faith we can be sure that God will be with us in the good times and the bad times and will never desert us if we keep in touch by prayer. Just remember he is always on the end of this very special telephone line. Our lives will never be a bed of roses but we can find comfort in the knowledge that he will be there with us every step of the way just as he was for Mary, Joseph and their families.

God bless you all and I hope you all enjoy Christmas wherever you are spending it.

FUND RAISING for HELP FOR HEROES

Matthew (Tex) Marshall was a dedicated, quiet and unassuming soldier, proud to wear his red beret.

In memory of the thirtieth anniversary of the death of my brother, Matthew, in Mayobridge, Northern Ireland on 18th November 1989, I created a Help for Heroes - Hero Fund, keeping Matthew's name alive, bringing family and friends together and to raise funds for all Heroes.

Matthew was a steady, reliable and trustworthy paratrooper, well liked and respected by his platoon. Above all, he was kind and generous. Matthew lived his life to the full because he went out to meet it with an abundance of happiness.

After initial training, Matthew joined 3 PARA in November 1987 and with 'A' Company he commenced his first tour of Northern Ireland, at the height of the troubles. A soldier's life is not easy at the best of times; in Northern Ireland it required rare qualities of resilience.



Matthew served his country and risked his life in the interests of others. Matthew will always be remembered with honour, by all who knew him, in the army, at home and in his childhood and teenage years.

On Sunday 17th November 2019, I brought in cakes to enjoy with our coffee after our service led by the Worship Team, in return for contributions to Matthew's Heroes Fund.

I would like to thank our church family for their generous donation to Help for Heroes, totalling £173. Your gifts will help provide life-changing support and recovery services to our Nation's heroes and their families, and all in Matthew's name and memory.

Iris Waite

Iris Waite was a much-loved member of our congregation who in her younger days was a lively member of our choir. She died on 19 October at the age of 92 and her funeral at Harwood Park was attended by a good contingent from our church.

Iris was born in Romford and grew up in Ilford in a house just round the corner from her best friend, Sylvia. They sent secret messages to each other from their bedroom windows and became life-long friends.

At school, Iris was a studious and bright girl and, although very shy, became head girl. After school, she worked in the Haberdashery section of a big store in Upminster. On a holiday in 1947, she met a handsome, red-headed man called Arthur, whom she nicknamed Rusty, a name which stayed with him for the rest of his life.

They were married in 1950 and lived with Rusty's father and brother in Peartree Lane while they built their own house in Handside Lane. They moved there in 1958 and 118 became their family home. They had three children, Gillian, Jacqueline and Jennifer who remember Iris as a wonderfully caring, loving mother and a true home-maker. Jacqui and Jenny remember how they would wake up, or come home from school, to find a favourite doll with a new hand-stitched outfit.

Iris loved music and gardening. Many a passer-by would stop to admire her roses and rockery. She was active in the community, joining the WI and volunteering for Meals on Wheels. In her 40s, she began to work as a receptionist at the Knightsfield practice. Her family were very proud of her when she passed her driving test at the age of 60.

Iris's family grew as her daughters married and had children, in whom she was always keenly interested. "Being together is everything" she would say. She was a very good listener and a wonderful grandmother.

In 2009, she had the great sadness of losing her oldest daughter, Gillian, to cancer and in 2015 her beloved Rusty died at the age of 93. By then they had moved to a cosy house in Welwyn. In 2018, Iris moved to Foxholes Care Home. By now she was a great-grandmother and her family remember her for her gentle, warm, loving nature her funny little sayings, her wonderful sense of humour and her love for all the family.

It was a celebration of appreciation for all the hard work the volunteers do at the Community Cafe' and for their support and dedication.

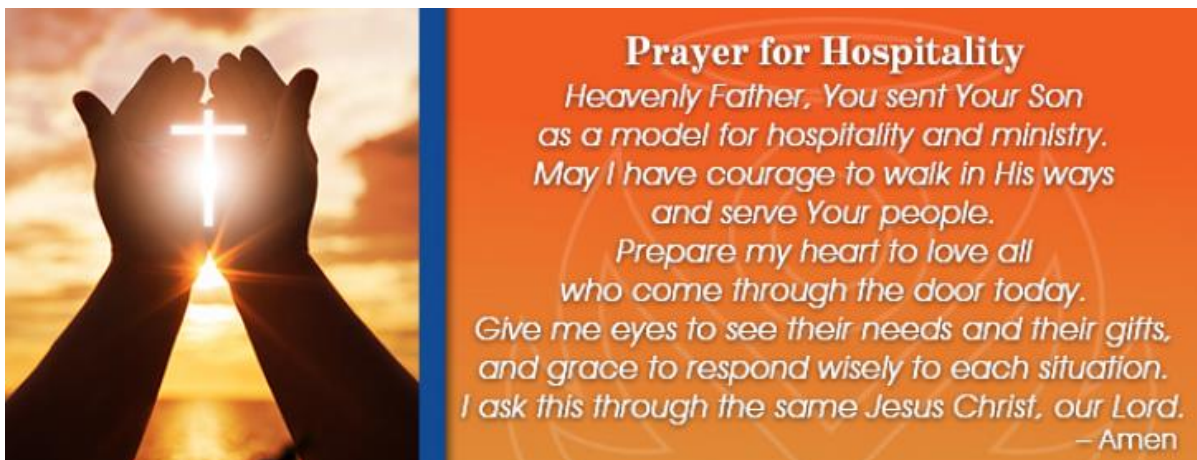

Whisper project wins funding for expenses

Welwyn Hatfield Interfaith are rejoicing with us about a new financial award towards expenses for the Whisper schools project in 2020. It's our biggest local grant yet, following those awarded for previous years by Herts County Council SACRE committee, and from Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council. This new money will be from the Police and Crime Commissioners fund, including proceeds recovered from criminals, to help meet the objective of reducing Hate Crime. The grant is administered by Herts Community Foundation. And the money will cover the travel and communications expenses needed to support the project, insurance, booking fees for some of our events, plus occasional purchases related to lessons and events.

Here is a short extract from the funding application: "Young people who encounter our faith visitors in school, or attend our events, are challenged to appreciate diversity, and people of faith. The project reduces prejudice in these formative years which reduces bullying at school, and will have lasting benefit for more peaceful society, social cohesion, and lower levels of hate crime in the longer term."

In many schools in Welwyn, Hatfield and Hertford, children from religious families may be the only one from that background in their class. So they are susceptible to isolation and bullying. Our experience to date shows children from religious families love it when a visitor comes from their own faith - it gives the child confidence to own their cultural heritage in school and helps the other pupils respect them, especially if the faith visitor has been interesting and given the children a great experience."

During 2020 the project aims to visit more primary schools, to increase our work in secondary schools, and to develop the local network we have just launched for local RE teachers – Welwyn Hatfield and Hertford Encouraging Religious Education (WHHERE). At the first meeting we had a talk from a Buddhist friend from Amaravati monastery at Gaddesden, and at the second a specialist from BRF delivered a training session on teaching Christianity-around-the-world. And we have already seen WHHERE generating new invitations for our faith visitors to get out to see primary classes.
